1 AN ACT concerning

2 Yard Waste and Food Residuals Diversion and Infrastructure Task Force

3 FOR the purpose of establishing the Yard Waste and Food Residuals Diversion and 4 Infrastructure Task Force; providing for the composition, cochairs, and staffing of $\mathbf{5}$ the Task Force; prohibiting a member of the Task Force from receiving certain 6 compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain expenses; requiring the 7 Task Force to identify, evaluate, study, and make recommendations regarding 8 certain matters; requiring the Task Force to report its interim and final findings and 9 recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly on or before certain 10 dates; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to the Yard 11 Waste and Food Residuals Diversion and Infrastructure Task Force.

12 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 13 That:

- 14 (a) There is a Yard Waste and Food Residuals Diversion and Infrastructure Task15 Force.
- 16 (b) The Task Force consists of the following members:
- 17 (1) one member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President of18 the Senate;
- 19(2)one member of the House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of the20House;
