CHAPTER _____

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Task Force to Study Increased Voter Participation**

3 FOR the purpose of establishing the Task Force to Study Increased Voter Participation;
4 providing for the composition, chair, and staffing of the Task Force; prohibiting a
5 member of the Task Force from receiving certain compensation, but authorizing the
6 reimbursement of certain expenses; requiring the Task Force to evaluate policies
7 that have the potential to increase voter participation; requiring the Task Force to
8 report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly
9 on or before a certain date; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally
10 relating to the Task Force to Study Increased Voter Participation.

11 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
12 That:

13 (a) There is a Task Force to Study Increased Voter Participation.

14 (b) The Task Force consists of:

15 (1) ~~two~~ three members of the Senate of Maryland, one of whom shall be
16 from the minority party, appointed by the President of the Senate;

1 (2) ~~two~~ three members of the House of Delegates, one of whom shall be from
2 the minority party, appointed by the Speaker of the House;

3 (3) the State Administrator of Elections, or the State Administrator's
4 designee; and

5 (4) the following members to be jointly appointed by the Speaker of the
6 House of Delegates and the President of the Senate:

7 (i) three representatives of nonprofit organizations advocating for
8 fair elections;

9 (ii) two attorneys with expertise in election law;

10 (iii) one representative of a nonprofit civil rights organization;

11 (iv) one representative of the Maryland Association of Election
12 Officials; and

13 (v) one representative of a postal workers union.

14 (c) The Speaker of the House of Delegates and the President of the Senate shall
15 jointly designate the chair of the Task Force.

16 (d) The Department of Legislative Services and the State Board of Elections shall
17 provide staff for the Task Force.

18 (e) A member of the Task Force:

19 (1) may not receive compensation as a member of the Task Force; but

20 (2) is entitled to reimbursement for expenses under the Standard State
21 Travel Regulations, as provided in the State budget.

22 (f) The Task Force shall:

23 (1) evaluate whether the following policies have the potential to encourage
24 greater voter participation:

25 (i) expansion of same-day voter registration to Election Day polling
26 places;

27 (ii) expansion of early voting and same-day voter registration
28 during early voting to additional locations, days, and hours, especially the days
29 immediately preceding Election Day;

1 (iii) a vote-by-mail system under which all registered voters receive
2 a ballot and return the ballot by mail; and

3 (iv) greater utilization of the State’s current opt-in vote-by-mail
4 system along with continued utilization of early voting centers and Election Day polling
5 places for in-person voting;

6 (2) identify any other policy changes that in the Task Force’s estimation
7 have the potential to increase voter participation; and

8 (3) for each policy listed in paragraph (1) of this subsection and any other
9 policies the Task Force identifies that have the potential to increase voter participation:

10 (i) evaluate the impact of the policy on the security and integrity of
11 the electoral process;

12 (ii) estimate the cost to the State and local boards of elections of
13 implementing the policy;

14 (iii) identify any other important effects of implementing the policy;

15 (iv) identify any measures that should be taken to mitigate any
16 adverse effects of implementing the policy; and

17 (v) considering all the advantages and disadvantages of the policy,
18 determine whether the Task Force recommends adoption of the policy.

19 (g) On or before December 31, 2017, the Task Force shall report its findings and
20 recommendations to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2-1246 of the State
21 Government Article, the General Assembly.

22 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June
23 1, 2016. It shall remain effective for a period of 2 years and 1 month and, at the end of June
24 30, 2018, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be
25 abrogated and of no further force and effect.
