## A BILL ENTITLED

### 1 AN ACT concerning

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#### Task Force to Study Increased Voter Participation

3 FOR the purpose of establishing the Task Force to Study Increased Voter Participation; 4 providing for the composition, chair, and staffing of the Task Force; prohibiting a  $\mathbf{5}$ member of the Task Force from receiving certain compensation, but authorizing the 6 reimbursement of certain expenses; requiring the Task Force to evaluate policies 7 that have the potential to increase voter participation; requiring the Task Force to 8 report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly 9 on or before a certain date; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally 10 relating to the Task Force to Study Increased Voter Participation.

# SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That:

- 13 (a) There is a Task Force to Study Increased Voter Participation.
- 14 (b) The Task Force consists of:
- 15 (1) two members of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President of16 the Senate;
- 17 (2) two members of the House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of 18 the House;
- 19 (3) the State Administrator of Elections, or the State Administrator's 20 designee; and
- (4) the following members to be jointly appointed by the Speaker of the
  House of Delegates and the President of the Senate:

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1 (3) for each policy listed in paragraph (1) of this subsection and any other 2 policies the Task Force identifies that have the potential to increase voter participation:

3 (i) evaluate the impact of the policy on the security and integrity of 4 the electoral process;

5 (ii) estimate the cost to the State and local boards of elections of 6 implementing the policy;

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(iii) identify any other important effects of implementing the policy;

8 (iv) identify any measures that should be taken to mitigate any 9 adverse effects of implementing the policy; and

(v) considering all the advantages and disadvantages of the policy,
 determine whether the Task Force recommends adoption of the policy.

12 (g) On or before December 31, 2017, the Task Force shall report its findings and 13 recommendations to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State 14 Government Article, the General Assembly.

15 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June 16 1, 2016. It shall remain effective for a period of 2 years and 1 month and, at the end of June 17 30, 2018, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be 18 abrogated and of no further force and effect.
