10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)				
<p>New Horizons Supported Services, Inc., a nonprofit founded in 1969, provides services and supports for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Through New Horizons, individuals with disabilities are empowered to live, work and thrive and more importantly, gain and maintain the necessary skills and resources to maximize their potential for independence and inclusion in the community, both vocationally and socially. New Horizons has expanded its service area to include Anne Arundel, Calvert, Charles, Montgomery and St. Mary's Counties as well as in the District of Columbia. Through its three training sites in Upper Marlboro, Cheverly, and Waldorf, New Horizons serves annually over 700 individuals in the region with disabilities with a staff of over 100.</p>				

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

The New Horizons Disability Job Training and Recycling Center continues to open new doors of employment for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. They learn marketable job skills and become wage earners either through community employment or as an employee of the agency's R3 Services, a recycling business enterprise. This business supports both regional and state-wide green initiatives, thus enhancing the environment by reducing the State's electronic waste in landfills. Through R3 Services, the project has a positive economic impact for the community and State by providing employment opportunities for 10-15 persons with disabilities with up to 5 staff managing the operation. As New Horizons continues to grow and expand its operation as an R2/RIOS certified recycling business, Phase II of the design and renovation of the Job Training and Recycling Center will provide accessibility and a barrier-free work environment for those with disabilities.

28. Comments

The initial grant, which was awarded in 2013, enabled New Horizons Supported Services, Inc. to renovate the former Cheverly Fire/EMS Station into a community-based job training and electronics recycling center. New Horizons has developed partnerships to include CyclePoint which is the electronics recycling service division of Source America; a partnership with the Division of Rehabilitation Services as well as with the U.S. Library of Congress. Such partnerships have provided and continue to provide both "green" jobs and new employment opportunities for Prince George's County citizens with and without disabilities.

Since opening the job training and e-recycling center in 2015, New Horizons has had the following successful outcomes:

New Horizons made the investment to be R2/RIOS certified, a high-level industry standards program that is independently verified by multiple onsite audits that can take up to a year to pass. With this certification that New Horizons passed on February 24, 2016, the agency is able to qualify for larger contracts that represent more revenue for the organization to invest in its programs as well as increasing the training and job opportunities for individuals with developmental disabilities.

Through New Horizons' business enterprise, R3 Services, ten employment opportunities have been created and filled.

R3 Services has developed partnerships locally, regionally and State-wide to promote vital green initiatives that promote a greener environment.

The most important and significant outcome of Phase I of renovations of the Cheverly site was New Horizons' amazing success in transforming so many individuals from having challenges in the workplace to being highly-focused, top producing employees. As a provider for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities, we seek opportunities that enable adults to gain skills that increase their capabilities, self-esteem, and self-worth that enable them to lead productive and fulfilled lives as well as to be contributing, community citizens.

Phase II is crucial for New Horizons to complete its renovations and further develop training and job opportunities for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. This project is a "win-win" not only for Prince George's County, but the State as it provides opportunities for those in need and for increasing the potential, possibilities and payroll for persons reaching new levels of independence and self-sufficiency. The project has proven and is an investment in people's lives, in our economy, in a greener environment and in the State's future.
