1 AN ACT concerning

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2 Individualized Education Programs – Burden of Proof in Due Process Hearings 3 and Studies

FOR the purpose of requiring certain complaining parties to bear a certain burden of proof
in due process hearings that are held to resolve a dispute relating to the provision of
a free appropriate public education to children with disabilities; providing a certain
exception that if a parent or guardian files a due process complaint against a public
agency concerning a dispute over the delivery of certain services or certain changes
<u>at a certain meeting</u>, the public agency is required to bear a certain burden of proof;
providing a certain exception that requires a parent or guardian seeking tuition

23	(g) (1) The decision of the administrative law judge shall be made on

25	appropriate public education.
26	(2) In matters alleging a procedural violation, an administrative law judge
27	may find that the child did not receive a free appropriate public education only if the
28	procedural inadequacies:
29	(i) Impeded the child's right to a free appropriate public education;

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1	(ii) Significantly impeded the parents' opportunity to participate in
2	the educational decision making process regarding the provision of a free appropriate public
3	education to the parents' child; or
4	(iii) Caused a deprivation of educational benefits.
5	(h) The hearing shall be held and a written decision shall be issued within the
6	time periods established by federal law. The administrative law judge may grant a specific
7	extension of time at the request of either party.
8	(i) If, at the time of the due process complaint, the child who is the subject of the
9	hearing is not enrolled and attending an approved educational program or, if the due
10	process complaint is over the placement or manifestation determination of a child, due to a
11	violation of the rules of conduct, an expedited hearing shall occur within 20 school days of
12	the date the hearing is requested and shall result in a decision within 10 school days of the
13	hearing.
14	(j) Within 120 calendar days of the issuance of the hearing decision, any party to
15	the hearing may file an appeal from a final decision of the Office of Administrative Hearings
16	to the federal District Court for Maryland or to the circuit court for the county in which the
17	child resides.
18	(k) (1) A public agency is not required to pay for the cost of education,
19	including special education and related services, for a child with a disability at a private or
20	nonpublic school if the public agency made a free appropriate public education available to
21	the child and the parent of the child elected to place the child in such a school or facility.
22	(2) If the parent of a child with a disability, who previously received special
23	education and related services under the authority of a public agency, enrolls the child in
24	a nonpublic school or facility without the consent of or referral by the public agency, an
25	administrative law judge or a court may require the public agency to reimburse the parent
26	for the costs of the placement enrollment if the administrative law judge or court
27	determines that the public agency had not made a free appropriate public education
28	available to the child in a timely manner prior to that enrollment.

12 (3) (4) make recommendations for reallocating public agency staff and 13 resources on the basis of geographical region so that public agencies may more effectively 14 assist the parents and guardians of children with disabilities to participate in the IEP 15 process and more timely and cost effectively resolve disputes concerning a child's special 16 education services or program.

17 (b) On or before December 31, 2018, the State Department of Education shall 18 report its findings and recommendations, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State 19 Government Article, to the General Assembly.

20 SECTION 3. <u>2.</u> AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That:

21(a) On or before December 31, 2017 July 1, 2018, the State Department of (1)22Education, in consultation with the Department of Budget and Management and the 23Department of Legislative Services, shall contract with a public or private entity to conduct 24a an independent study of the individualized education program (IEP) process in the State, 25including the procedures relating to the identification, evaluation, and educational 26placement of a child, the provision of a free and appropriate education, and the dispute 27resolution procedures provided under § 8–413 of the Education Article.

28 (2) The entity that conducts the study shall seek input from special 29 education teachers, special education advocates, and special education organizations.

30 (b) At a minimum, the study shall:

(1) review and assess how the State Department of Education staff, local
 32 school system staff, and other State agency staff comply with State and federal law
 33 governing the IEP process;

34 (2) review and assess how local school systems spend their special 35 education funds and allocate their teaching and family support services staff;

(3) (2) review and assess the effectiveness of special education family support
 services provided by local school system staff members;

3 (4) (3) review and assess how the State Department of Education can provide 4 local school systems utilize technical assistance provided by the State Department of 5 Education to local school systems to assist parents in understanding their rights and 6 responsibilities in the IEP process;

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(4) identify best practices for retaining special education teachers;

8 (5) identify and highlight the best practices currently utilized by the State 9 Department of Education staff, local system staff, and other State agency staff as part of 10 the IEP process in the State; and

- (6) make recommendations for:

12 (i) ensuring that special education funds are being spent cost 13 effectively;

(ii) ensuring that local school systems are effectively allocating their
teaching and family support services staff to improve the education achievement of special
education students;

(iii) clarifying and simplifying the IEP process to enable parents and
 guardians to more easily understand their rights and responsibilities in the process; and

19 (iv) modifying the administrative goals, objectives, and strategies of 20 teachers and IEP teams to make them more efficient and cost effective in their delivery of 21 services to special education students, including potential reductions in caseloads and 22 recordkeeping.

(c) The Governor shall include sufficient funds in the State budget for the
 appropriate fiscal years for the State Department of Education to cover the costs of
 conducting the study.

(d) On or before December 31, 2018 July 1, 2019, the State Department of
Education shall report the findings and recommendations of the study, in accordance with
§ 2–1246 of the State Government Article, to the General Assembly.

29SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That Section 1 of this Act shall take30effect July 1, 2020.

31 <u>SECTION 5.</u> 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, except as provided in 32 <u>Section 4 of this Act</u>, this Act shall take effect June 1, 2017. <u>Sections 2 and 3 of this Act It</u> 33 <u>Sections 2 and 3 of this Act shall take effect June 1, 2017.
