A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **University of Maryland School of Public Health, Center for Health Equity –**
3 **Workgroup on Health in All Policies**

4 FOR the purpose of requiring the University of Maryland School of Public Health, Center
5 for Health Equity, in consultation with the Department of Health and Mental
6 Hygiene, to convene a workgroup to study and make recommendations to units of
7 State and local government on laws and policies to implement that will positively
8 impact the health of residents of the State; requiring the workgroup, using a certain
9 framework, to examine certain matters, make certain recommendations, and foster
10 collaboration among units of State and local government; requiring the workgroup
11 to include certain members; requiring, to the extent practicable, the workgroup to
12 reflect a certain diversity; prohibiting a member of the workgroup from receiving
13 certain compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain expenses;
14 requiring a unit of State government to provide information requested by the
15 workgroup in a certain manner; requiring a unit of State government represented on
16 the workgroup to provide certain staff support; requiring, on or before a certain date,
17 the University of Maryland School of Public Health, Center for Health Equity, to
18 report certain findings and recommendations to certain committees of the General
19 Assembly; defining a certain term; providing for the termination of this Act; and
20 generally relating to a workgroup convened by the University of Maryland School of
21 Public Health, Center for Health Equity, to study and make recommendations
22 relating to the health of residents of the State.

23 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
24 That:

25 (a) In this section, “Health in All Policies framework” means a public health
26 framework through which policymakers and stakeholders in the public and private sectors
27 use a collaborative approach to improve health outcomes and reduce health inequities in

1 the State by incorporating health considerations into decision making across sectors and
2 policy areas.

3 (b) The University of Maryland School of Public Health, Center for Health Equity,
4 in consultation with the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, shall convene a
5 workgroup to study and make recommendations to units of State and local government on
6 laws and policies to implement that will positively impact the health of residents of the
7 State.

8 (c) The workgroup shall examine:

9 (1) the health of residents of the State to the extent necessary to carry out
10 the requirements of this section;

11 (2) ways for units of State and local government to collaborate to
12 implement policies that will positively impact the health of residents of the State; and

13 (3) the impact of the following factors on the health of residents of the
14 State:

15 (i) access to safe and affordable housing;

16 (ii) educational attainment;

17 (iii) opportunities for employment;

18 (iv) economic stability;

19 (v) inclusion, diversity, and equity in the workplace;

20 (vi) barriers to career success and promotion in the workplace;

21 (vii) access to transportation and mobility;

22 (viii) social justice;

23 (ix) environmental factors; and

24 (x) public safety, including the impact of crime, citizen unrest, the
25 criminal justice system, and governmental policies that affect individuals who are in prison
26 or released from prison.

27 (d) The workgroup, using a Health in All Policies framework, shall:

28 (1) examine and make recommendations regarding how health
29 considerations may be incorporated into the decision-making processes of government
30 agencies and private stakeholders who interact with government agencies;

(2) foster collaboration among units of State and local government and develop laws and policies to improve health and reduce health inequities; and

(3) make recommendations on how laws and policies to improve health and reduce health inequities may be implemented.

5 (e) The workgroup required under this section shall include:

6 (1) the Secretary of Human Resources, or the Secretary's designee;

7 (2) the State Secretary of Transportation, or the Secretary's designee;

(3) the Secretary of Housing and Community Development, or the Secretary's designee;

10 (4) the Secretary of the Environment, or the Secretary's designee;

11 (5) the Secretary of Agriculture, or the Secretary's designee;

12 (6) the Secretary of Labor, Licensing, and Regulation, or the Secretary's
13 designee;

14 (7) the State Superintendent of Schools, or the State Superintendent's
15 designee;

16 (8) the Commissioner of Correction, or the Commissioner's designee; and

17 (9) the following members:

18 (i) one representative of the Office of Minority Health and Health
19 Disparities;

20 (ii) one representative of the Maryland Higher Education
21 Commission; and

22 (iii) one representative of the Maryland Hospital Association.

23 (f) To the extent practicable, the members of the workgroup shall reflect the
24 geographic, racial, ethnic, cultural, and gender diversity of the State.

25 (g) A member of the workgroup:

26 (1) may not receive compensation as a member of the workgroup; but

27 (2) is entitled to reimbursement for expenses under the Standard State
28 Travel Regulations, as provided in the State budget.

(2) A unit of State government represented on the workgroup shall provide staff support requested by the workgroup.

10 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June
11 1, 2017. It shall remain effective for a period of 2 years and 1 month and, at the end of June
12 30, 2019, with no further action required by the General Assembly, this Act shall be
13 abrogated and of no further force and effect.
