House Bill 131

(Chair, Environment and Transportation Committee)(By Request - Departmental - Planning)

Environment and Transportation

State Planning - Central Depository

This departmental bill clarifies that the Maryland Department of Planning (MDP) is the central depository for all land use plans, and amendments and revisions to the plans, adopted by a unit of the State government, of a regional government, or of a local government, or by an interstate agency. The plans, amendments, and revisions must be submitted by the unit of government or agency to MDP in electronic form and posted by MDP on the department's website.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: The bill can be implemented with existing resources.

Local Effect: The bill is expected to be implemented by local governments with existing resources.

Small Business Effect: MDP has determined that this bill has minimal or no impact on small business (attached). The Department of Legislative Services concurs with this assessment.

Analysis

Current Law: MDP must establish a central depository for specified general, area, and functional plans, and all amendments or revisions to the plans, prepared by any unit of the State government, of a regional government, or of a local government, or by any interstate agency. Each unit of government and interstate agency must submit to MDP plans required by regulations adopted by the Secretary of Planning. MDP's implementing regulations

describe the depository as a resource center for the department, as well as State, interstate, regional, and local government agencies, citizens, interest groups, government consultants, and others. Under the regulations, copies of plans, and amendments or revisions to the plans, are submitted to the department's physical address and made available for examination and use during regular office hours at the department's central office.

Background: MDP indicates that the current statutory and regulatory requirements for the central depository are not followed consistently and there have not been recent requests to view the plans since most are available online on the jurisdictions' websites. Allowing for the plans to be submitted and maintained electronically is expected to create a more streamlined and user-friendly system.
