## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A House Joint Resolution concerning

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## Federal Title 5 Rights for Transportation Security Administration Workers

- FOR the purpose of urging the U.S. Congress to extend federal Title 5 rights to Transportation Security Administration workers; and generally relating to the rights for Transportation Security Administration workers.
- WHEREAS, On November 19, 2001, the U.S. Congress passed and President George
  W. Bush signed the Aviation and Transportation Security Act to enhance the level of
  security screening throughout the nation's aviation system and transfer responsibility for
  airline passenger screening from the private sector to a new federal agency, the
  Transportation Security Administration (TSA); and
- WHEREAS, TSA is an integral component of the security framework and is responsible for screening more than 738 million airline passengers annually; and
- WHEREAS, In Maryland, TSA workers at the Baltimore/Washington International Thurgood Marshall Airport, one of the busiest airports in the country, serve over 25 million airline passengers annually; and
- WHEREAS, The transportation security officer workforce is denied the same rights under Title 5 of the United States Code as other federal workers, including the right to present grievances to a neutral third party, fair pay under the General Services wage system, including access to overtime pay and earned leave, application of the federal Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, fair performance appraisals under Chapter 73 of Title 5 of the United States Code, and direct protections against employment discrimination found in Title 7 of the United States Code; and
- WHEREAS, Transportation security officers put their safety on the line to protect the flying public and deserve more rights and protections in the workplace; now, therefore, be it
