1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Baltimore City – South Baltimore Gateway Community Impact District**
3 **Management Authority – Distribution of Local Impact Grants**

4 FOR the purpose of specifying that the State distribute certain funding directly to the South
5 Baltimore Gateway Community Impact District Management Authority; providing,
6 under certain circumstances, that a certain percentage of local impact grants from
7 video lottery proceeds be distributed directly to the Authority; ~~defining a certain~~
8 ~~term;~~ and generally relating to the distribution of local impact grants from video
9 lottery proceeds in Baltimore City.

SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

The Charter of Baltimore City

Article II – General Powers

The Mayor and City Council of Baltimore shall have full power and authority to exercise all of the powers heretofore or hereafter granted to it by the Constitution of Maryland or by any Public General or Public Local Laws of the State of Maryland; and in particular, without limitation upon the foregoing, shall have power by ordinance, or such other method as may be provided for in its Charter, subject to the provisions of said Constitution and Public General Laws:

(c) (1) The ordinance establishing the South Baltimore Gateway Community Impact District Management Authority shall address the following:

(i) specify the powers and functions within the limits of this section, which may be exercised and conducted by the Authority and **PROVIDE THAT THE STATE** fund the Authority with not less than **THE** 50% of the local impact grants from video lottery proceeds [distributed to Baltimore City under § 9–1A–31(a)(3)(i)] **THAT §**

(a) ~~IN THIS SECTION, “LOCAL JURISDICTION” INCLUDES THE SOUTH BALTIMORE GATEWAY COMMUNITY IMPACT DISTRICT MANAGEMENT AUTHORITY.~~

~~(b)~~ (1) Except as provided in paragraph (8) of this subsection, the local impact grants provided under § 9–1A–27 of this subtitle shall be distributed as provided in this subsection.

1 (2) The following amounts shall be distributed to the following
2 jurisdictions:

- 3 (i) Allegany County – \$200,000;
- 4 (ii) Cecil County – \$130,000;
- 5 (iii) Town of Perryville – \$70,000; and
- 6 (iv) Worcester County – \$200,000.

7 (3) The remaining funds for local impact grants shall be distributed in the
8 following manner:

9 (i) 82% to the local jurisdictions with video lottery facilities, based
10 on each jurisdiction's percentage of overall gross revenues from video lottery terminals; and

11 (ii) except as provided in paragraph (4) of this subsection, for
12 operations at a video lottery facility starting in fiscal year 2012 and ending in fiscal year
13 2032, 18% to Baltimore City with the Pimlico Community Development Authority acting
14 as the local development council in accordance with subsection ~~[(d)]~~ ~~(E)~~ of this section, to
15 be distributed primarily for capital projects benefiting economic and community
16 development in the following manner:

17 1. at least 75% in a manner that is consistent with the Park
18 Heights Master Plan; and

19 2. the remainder dedicated to the needs of:

20 A. any census blockgroup that Baltimore City identifies as
21 being located partly or entirely within 1 mile of Pimlico Race Course but not within the
22 boundaries of the Park Heights Master Plan in a manner that is consistent with adopted
23 neighborhood priorities;

24 B. any neighborhood included in the Northwest Community
25 Planning Forum Strategic Neighborhood Action Plan in a manner that is consistent with
26 the adopted Northwest Community Planning Forum Strategic Neighborhood Action Plan
27 priorities; and

28 C. beginning after a video lottery operation license is issued
29 to a video lottery facility in Baltimore City, any neighborhood within an area bounded by
30 Liberty Heights Avenue, Northern Parkway, Druid Park Drive, and Wabash Avenue in a
31 manner that is consistent with adopted neighborhood priorities.

32 (4) (i) Of the amount specified under paragraph (3)(ii) of this
33 subsection:

1 1. \$1,000,000 shall be provided annually to Prince George's
2 County to be used for public safety projects in the community within 5 miles surrounding
3 Rosecroft Raceway; and

4 2. for fiscal years 2015 through 2019, \$500,000 shall be
5 provided annually for impact aid to be distributed as provided under § 11-404(d) of the
6 Business Regulation Article to help pay for facilities and services in communities within 3
7 miles of the Laurel Race Course.

8 (ii) The Legislative Policy Committee shall report its findings and
9 recommendations concerning the advisability of the continuation of the distribution of
10 funds after fiscal year 2032 to the Comptroller and, in accordance with § 2-1246 of this
11 article, the General Assembly, on or before November 1, 2030.

12 (5) Anne Arundel County, Howard County, Prince George's County, and
13 the City of Laurel shall report to the Legislative Policy Committee by December 31 of each
14 year as to the distribution of the funds provided under this section.

15 (6) Baltimore City shall:

16 (i) **EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION ~~(C)(3)(I)~~ (B)(3)(I) OF**
17 **THIS SECTION**, establish a schedule for the distribution and expenditure of funds provided
18 under this section; and

19 (ii) provide a quarterly report to the Legislative Policy Committee on
20 the distribution of the funds provided under this section.

21 (7) (i) The distribution under paragraph (3)(i) of this subsection to
22 Anne Arundel County, Baltimore City, and Prince George's County equals the sum of the
23 amounts to be distributed to Anne Arundel County, Baltimore City, and Prince George's
24 County divided by three.

25 (ii) Notwithstanding subparagraph (i) of this paragraph, the amount
26 distributed to Anne Arundel County and Baltimore City under paragraph (3)(i) of this
27 subsection may not be less than the amount received in the fiscal year before the video
28 lottery operation license for a video lottery facility in Prince George's County was issued.

29 (8) Beginning after a video lottery operation license is issued to a video
30 lottery facility in Baltimore City, 100% of the local impact grants provided under §
31 9-1A-27 of this subtitle from the proceeds of the video lottery facilities located in Allegany,
32 Cecil, and Worcester counties shall be distributed to the local jurisdictions in which those
33 video lottery facilities are located.

34 ~~[(b)] (e)~~ (1) Except as otherwise provided in paragraphs (2) and (3) of this
35 subsection and subject to paragraph (4) of this subsection, local impact grants provided

1 under subsection ~~[(a)(3)(i)] (B)(3)(I)~~ of this section shall be used for improvements
2 primarily in the communities in immediate proximity to the video lottery facilities and may
3 be used for the following purposes:

- 4 (i) infrastructure improvements;
- 5 (ii) facilities;
- 6 (iii) public safety;
- 7 (iv) sanitation;
- 8 (v) economic and community development, including housing; and
- 9 (vi) other public services and improvements.

10 (2) (i) Subject to subparagraph (ii) of this paragraph, in Allegany
11 County, local impact grants provided under subsection ~~[(a)(3)(i)] (B)(3)(I)~~ of this section
12 may be used:

- 13 1. for purposes listed in paragraph (1) of this subsection
14 throughout the county; and
- 15 2. to pay down the debt incurred by the county in the
16 construction and related costs for the golf course, lodge, and other improvements in Rocky
17 Gap State Park.

18 (ii) At least 20% of the local impact grants provided under subsection
19 ~~[(a)(3)(i)] (B)(3)(I)~~ of this section in Allegany County shall be used for capital projects for
20 municipalities and nonprofit organizations in the county.

21 (3) In Baltimore City:

22 (i) beginning in fiscal year 2018, at least 50% of the local impact
23 grants provided under subsection ~~[(a)(3)(i)] (B)(3)(I)~~ of this section shall be distributed
24 **DIRECTLY** to the South Baltimore Gateway Community Impact District Management
25 Authority; and

26 (ii) local impact grants provided under subsection ~~[(a)(3)(i)]~~
27 ~~(B)(3)(I)~~ of this section shall be used for improvements in the communities in immediate
28 proximity to the video lottery facility and may be used for the following purposes:

- 29 1. infrastructure improvements;
- 30 2. facilities;

- 1 3. public safety;
- 2 4. sanitation;
- 3 5. economic and community development, including housing;
- 4 and
- 5 6. other public services and improvements.

6 (4) (i) 1. Subject to subparagraph 2 of this subparagraph, in
7 Prince George's County, 40% of local impact grants provided under this section shall be
8 used to address infrastructure needs related to Maryland Route 210 in Prince George's
9 County.

10 2. The amount of local impact grants used as provided in
11 subparagraph 1 of this subparagraph may not exceed \$15,000,000 in a fiscal year.

12 3. Prince George's County may be reimbursed by the State
13 for any money used as provided in this subparagraph.

14 (ii) In Prince George's County, \$125,000 of the local impact grants
15 provided under this section shall be provided annually to be used in communities within
16 2.5 miles northeast of the video lottery facility in Prince George's County.

17 ~~[(c)] (D)~~ (1) A local development council shall be established in each
18 geographic area where a video lottery facility is located.

19 (2) Subject to paragraph (3) of this subsection, a local development council
20 shall consist of the following 15 members appointed by the chief executive of the county in
21 which the local development council is located, in consultation with the Senators and
22 Delegates who represent the communities surrounding the facility and the respective
23 county councils, city councils, or county commissioners:

24 (i) one Senator who represents the district where the facility is
25 located or the Senator's designee;

26 (ii) two Delegates who represent the districts where the
27 communities surrounding the facility are located or the Delegates' designees;

28 (iii) one representative of the video lottery operation licensee;

29 (iv) seven residents of the communities in immediate proximity to
30 the facility; and

31 (v) four representatives of businesses or institutions located in
32 immediate proximity to the facility.

1 (3) (i) If the video lottery facility is at a racetrack location at Laurel
2 Park, the County Executive of Anne Arundel County, the County Executive of Prince
3 George's County, and the County Executive of Howard County shall jointly appoint the
4 local development council.

5 (ii) If the video lottery facility is at a racetrack location at the Ocean
6 Downs Race Course:

7 1. the County Commissioners of Worcester County shall
8 appoint the local development council;

9 2. the Senator or the Senator's designee shall serve as a
10 member of the local development council; and

11 3. the Delegates or the Delegates' designees shall serve as
12 members of the local development council.

13 ~~[(d)]~~ ~~(E)~~ (1) Prior to any expenditure of local impact grant funds provided
14 under § 9-1A-27 of this subtitle, a county or municipality shall develop, in consultation
15 with the local development council, a multiyear plan for the expenditure of the local impact
16 grant funds for services and improvements consistent with subsection ~~[(b)]~~ ~~(C)~~ of this
17 section.

18 (2) A county or municipality shall submit the plan to the local development
19 council for review and comment before adopting the plan or expending any grant funds.

20 (3) The local development council shall advise the county or municipality
21 on the impact of the facility on the communities and the needs and priorities of the
22 communities in immediate proximity to the facility.

23 (4) (i) A local development council shall have 45 days to review,
24 comment, and make recommendations on the plan required under this subsection.

25 (ii) Except as provided in subparagraph (iii) of this paragraph, on
26 the request of a local development council, the county or municipality shall hold a public
27 hearing on the plan.

28 (iii) Baltimore City shall hold a public hearing on the plan for the
29 expenditure of funds allocated under subsection ~~[(a)(3)(ii)]~~ ~~(B)(3)(ii)~~ of this section.

30 (5) A county or municipality shall make best efforts to accommodate the
31 recommendations of the local development council and any testimony presented at the
32 hearing before adopting the plan required under this subsection.

1 ~~[(e)] (F)~~ A video lottery operation licensee shall provide to the local development
2 council a master plan for the development of the site on which the video lottery facility will
3 be located.
