A BILL ENTITLED

16 Preamble

17 WHEREAS, Pongal, also known as Thai Pongal, is one of the main festivals
18 celebrating the importance of the harvest in the state of Tamil Nadu in southern India; and

19 WHEREAS, Similar to Thanksgiving Day in the United States, Pongal is a festival
20 of thanksgiving to mother nature, the earth, farm animals, and the sun, in the form of Lord
21 Suryan, for the resources necessary for the bountiful yield of crops; and

22 WHEREAS, Pongal Day, a 4–day festival that typically begins on January 14 and
23 ends on January 17, is exemplified by the phrase in the Tamil language “Thai Pirandhaal
24 Vazhi Pirakkum”, meaning “the beginning of the Thai month will open avenues for a better
25 life”; and

1 WHEREAS, On the first day of Pongal, called Bhogi in honor of Lord Indra, people
2 welcome prosperity by cleaning and throwing away old and unwanted items to make way
3 for new things, and the day is celebrated with a bonfire; and

4 WHEREAS, The second day of Pongal, Thai Pongal, focuses on the worship of Lord
5 Suryan and is celebrated with puja rituals, colorful kolam or rangoli decorations, offerings
6 of sugar cane, and cooking the Ponga, a sweet made of rice; and

7 WHEREAS, The third day of Pongal, called Mattu Pongal, celebrates the importance
8 of farm animals to the harvest, especially cows, and animals are decorated and worshipped
9 and the day is replete with rituals; and

10 WHEREAS, The final day of Pongal, called Kanum Pongal, is spent relaxing and
11 visiting family members and friends, and many families take leisure trips on this day and
12 elders often treat younger members of the family with gifts to show their love; and

WHEREAS, The Indian–American community makes many important contributions to economic growth in the State, with highly educated professionals and entrepreneurs who work in a variety of fields, open new businesses, and create jobs, all the while continuing to observe and celebrate their rich cultural heritage; and

17 WHEREAS, Pongal Day brings together members of the Indian-American
18 community as they celebrate with gatherings, decorations, and special foods; now,
19 therefore,

20 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
21 That Section(s) 7-402 through 7-417, respectively, of Article – General Provisions of the
22 Annotated Code of Maryland be renumbered to be Section(s) 7-403 through 7-418,
23 respectively.

24 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Laws of Maryland read
25 as follows:

Article – General Provisions

27 7-402.

THE GOVERNOR ANNUALLY SHALL PROCLAIM JANUARY 14 AS PONGAL DAY.

29 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect
30 October 1, 2018.
