10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)

The purpose of the Maces Lane Community Center Project Steering Committee is to guide the progress of the redevelopment of the decommissioned Maces Lane School into a vibrant community center that serves the citizens of Cambridge and of Dorchester County. The steering committee is comprised of individuals who, through their participation in the two parent organizations (The Good Shepherds Association and the Maces Lane Alumni Association) have demonstrated their capacity for directing projects which support and uplift the community.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)
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The Maces Lane Community Center project will help address the various needs of at-risk communities in Cambridge and Dorchester County by providing a facility that will be used to enhance and expand existing programs and create new programs where necessary. The programs instituted through this project will work towards decreasing unfavorable statistics related to poverty, drug use, etc. We have a need for resources that explicitly benefit children and families including tutoring, educational and other counseling services, access to and education about healthy food, and spaces for recreational and community activities. For example, in 2015 there was one accidental drug overdose death in Dorchester County.

(continued from #11) In 2016 that number rose dramatically to six accidental drug overdose deaths in Dorchester County. All six of those fatalities were related to opioid use, which has reached epidemic proportions in Maryland. These deaths are are the most obvious evidence of the high levels of drug abuse in our area, which affects not only adults but entire families, including school age children. Furthermore, a substantial amount of the Citys population lives below the poverty line--over half of Dorchester County primary school students receive free or reduced priced lunch. These students suffer decreased achievement on standardized testing, scoring 8.5 points below all other students at the elementary school level. Based on our research, we believe that filling the existing gaps in services for these kinds of programs will go a long way toward improving the quality of life for our most vulnerable citizens. After school programming has been shown to improve students academic performance, improve classroom behavior, decrease drug use, encourage physical activity and good dietary habits, and improve parents economic output (Interagency Working Group on Youth Programs). The proposed community center will strive to provide resources in a way that is progressive, inclusive, and sustainable.
