## A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

## 2 Task Force on Forest Conservation in Maryland

- 3 FOR the purpose of establishing the Task Force on Forest Conservation in Maryland; 4 providing for the composition, chair, and staffing of the Task Force; authorizing the 5 Task Force to establish subcommittees; prohibiting a member of the Task Force from receiving certain compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain 6 7 expenses; requiring the Task Force to study and make recommendations regarding 8 certain matters; requiring the Task Force to report its findings and 9 recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly on or before a certain 10 date; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to the Task 11 Force on Forest Conservation in Maryland.
- 12 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 13 That:
- 14 (a) There is a Task Force on Forest Conservation in Maryland.
- 15 (b) The Task Force consists of the following members:
- 16 (1) the State Forester;
- 17 (2) one member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President of 18 the Senate;
- 19 (3) one member of the House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of the 20 House:
- 21 (4) two representatives of county government, designated by the Maryland 22 Association of Counties;

1 two representatives of municipal government, designated by the (5)2 Maryland Municipal League; and 3 the following members, appointed jointly by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House: 4 5 one representative of the Sustainable Forestry Council; (i) 6 one representative of the Chesapeake Bay Program Office within (ii) 7 the University of Maryland College of Agriculture and Natural Resources; one representative of the Department of Agricultural and 8 (iii) 9 Resource Economics within the University of Maryland College of Agriculture and Natural 10 Resources: 11 (iv) one representative of the Chesapeake Bay Commission; 12(v) two representatives from environmental organizations; 13 (vi) one representative from a land preservation organization; 14 two representatives from the commercial and residential (vii) development industries; 15 16 (viii) one representative from an environmental restoration business involved in forest mitigation banking; 17 one representative from a public utility; and 18 (ix) 19 one representative from a public health organization. (x) 20 The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House shall jointly select 21the chair or cochairs of the Task Force. 22 (d) The Harry R. Hughes Center for Agro–Ecology shall: 23 provide staff for the Task Force under contract with the Department of (1) 24Natural Resources; and 25facilitate the meetings of the Task Force and the preparation of its final (2)26 report with assistance, as required by the Task Force, from the Department of Legislative Services, the Department of Natural Resources, the Department of the Environment, the 2728 Department of Planning, and the Department of Agriculture. 29 The Task Force may establish subcommittees as necessary to fulfill its duties. (e)

- 1 (3) on or before October 1, 2019, conduct a public hearing to gather 2 information to assist in making recommendations; and
- 3 (4) draft a report on the findings of the technical review and make 4 recommendations regarding the statutory, regulatory, or policy changes needed to achieve 5 the policy goals established under § 5–102(b) of the Natural Resources Article.
- 6 (h) On or before December 1, 2019, the Task Force shall submit a final report of its findings and recommendations to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly.
- 9 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June 10 1, 2019. It shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and 1 month and, at the end of June 11 30, 2020, this Act, with no further action required by the General Assembly, shall be 12 abrogated and of no further force and effect.
