2 (a) (8) "Speed monitoring system" means a device with one or more motor 3 vehicle sensors producing recorded images of motor vehicles traveling at speeds at least 12 4 miles per hour above the posted speed limit.

5 (b) (1) (vi) This section applies to a violation of this subtitle recorded by a 6 speed monitoring system that meets the requirements of this subsection and has been 7 placed:

8 1. In Montgomery County, on a highway in a residential 9 district, as defined in § 21–101 of this title, with a maximum posted speed limit of 35 miles 10 per hour, which speed limit was established using generally accepted traffic engineering 11 practices;

12 2. In a school zone with a posted speed limit of at least 20 13 miles per hour; [or]

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3. In Prince George's County:

A. Subject to subparagraph (vii) of this paragraph, at the intersection of Old Fort Road and Maryland Route 210 (Indian Head Highway); or

B. On that part of a highway located within the grounds of an institution of higher education as defined in § 10–101(h) of the Education Article, or within one-half mile of the grounds of a building or property used by the institution of higher education where generally accepted traffic and engineering practices indicate that motor vehicle, pedestrian, or bicycle traffic is substantially generated or influenced by the institution of higher education; **OR**

(ix) 1. [A] EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSUBPARAGRAPH 2
 OF THIS SUBPARAGRAPH, A speed monitoring system in a school zone may operate only
 Monday through Friday between 6:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m.

28 2. IN BALTIMORE CITY, A SPEED MONITORING SYSTEM 29 MAY OPERATE AT ANY TIME DETERMINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF 30 BALTIMORE CITY.

(L) NOTWITHSTANDING THE PROVISIONS OF SUBSECTION (A)(8) OF THIS
 SECTION, THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE CITY MAY ESTABLISH A
 UNIFORM SPEED TOLERANCE FOR SPEED MONITORING SYSTEMS IN BALTIMORE
 CITY.

1 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 2 October 1, 2019.
