A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 Emergency Management – Chief Resilience Officer – Appointment and Duties

3 FOR the purpose of requiring the Director of the Maryland Emergency Management 4 Agency to appoint a Chief Resilience Officer; providing that the Chief Resilience $\mathbf{5}$ Officer serves at the pleasure of the Director; providing for the salary of the Chief 6 Resilience Officer and the categorization of the Chief Resilience Officer in the State 7 Personnel Management System; establishing the duties and responsibilities of the 8 Chief Resilience Officer; requiring the Chief Resilience Officer to prioritize certain 9 efforts and ensure the collaboration of certain State agencies and programs in addressing certain priorities in certain years; requiring the Adaptation and 10 11 Resiliency Workgroup of the Maryland Commission on Climate Change to provide 12certain support and assistance to the Chief Resilience Officer and to take certain 13 actions with respect to the Workgroup's membership under certain circumstances; 14requiring the Department of the Environment to provide certain assistance to the 15Chief Resilience Officer; requiring the University of Maryland Center for 16 Environmental Science to provide certain assistance to the Chief Resilience Officer; 17requiring the Chief Resilience Officer to make a certain annual report to the Governor, the State Treasurer, and the General Assembly on or before a certain date; 1819and generally relating to the Chief Resilience Officer.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 1 $\mathbf{2}$ That the Laws of Maryland read as follows: 3 **Article - Public Safety** 14-101. 4 In this subtitle the following words have the meanings indicated. $\mathbf{5}$ (a) "Director" means the Director of MEMA. 6 (b)"Emergency" means the threat or occurrence of: 7 (c) 8 a hurricane, tornado, storm, flood, high water, wind-driven water, tidal (1)9 wave, earthquake, landslide, mudslide, snowstorm, drought, fire, explosion, and any other 10 disaster in any part of the State that requires State assistance to supplement local efforts 11 in order to save lives and protect public health and safety; or 12(2)an enemy attack, act of terrorism, or public health catastrophe. 13 "Emergency management" means the preparation for and carrying out (d) (1)of functions in an emergency in order to save lives and to minimize and repair injury and 14damage that result from emergencies beyond the capabilities of local authorities. 1516 "Emergency management" does not include the preparation for and (2)carrying out of functions in an emergency for which military forces are primarily 1718 responsible. 19(e) "Local organization for emergency management" means an organization 20established by a political subdivision or other local authority under § 14–109 of this subtitle. 21"MEMA" means the Maryland Emergency Management Agency. (f) 22"Political subdivision" means a county or municipal corporation of the State. 1 (D) (1) THE CHIEF RESILIENCE OFFICER IS RESPONSIBLE FOR 2 COORDINATING STATE AND LOCAL EFFORTS TO BUILD RESILIENCE TO RISKS 3 IDENTIFIED IN THE MARYLAND HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN.

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(2) DUTIES OF THE CHIEF RESILIENCE OFFICER SHALL INCLUDE:

5 (I) OVERSEEING THE DEVELOPMENT OF A STATE RESILIENCE 6 STRATEGY TO BUILD RESILIENCE TO RISKS IDENTIFIED IN THE MARYLAND HAZARD 7 MITIGATION PLAN;

10(III) IDENTIFYING, SECURING, AND ASSISTING IN ACCESSING11FEDERAL, STATE, AND LOCAL FUNDING STREAMS AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE12THAT CAN BE USED TO SUPPORT STATE AND LOCAL RESILIENCE EFFORTS; AND

(IV) WORKING WITH BUSINESS LEADERS FROM INDUSTRIES
VULNERABLE TO THE RISKS IDENTIFIED IN THE MARYLAND HAZARD MITIGATION
PLAN TO IDENTIFY BEST PRACTICES FOR PREPARING FOR AND RESPONDING TO
THOSE RISKS.

17 (3) (I) THIS PARAGRAPH APPLIES IN CALENDAR YEARS 2020 18 THROUGH 2024, INCLUSIVE, OR UNTIL THERE IS A SUBSTANTIAL CHANGE TO THE 19 RISK ASSESSMENT PORTION OF THE MARYLAND HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN.
