

# SENATE BILL 762

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## A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Education – High School Graduation Requirements – Applications for Student**  
3 **Financial Aid**

4 FOR the purpose of requiring certain public high school students, beginning in a certain  
5 school year, to complete and submit a certain form to the U.S. Department of  
6 Education, the Maryland Higher Education Commission, or a county board of  
7 education as a requirement for graduation; requiring a county board to waive a  
8 certain requirement under certain circumstances; requiring the State Department  
9 of Education to adopt certain regulations; requiring certain regulations to include  
10 certain guidelines; requiring a county board to report certain information to certain  
11 committees of the General Assembly on or before a certain date each year for a  
12 certain number of years; and generally relating to graduation requirements for  
13 public high school students.

24 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,  
25 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

26 **Article – Education**

2 (a) The State Board shall establish high school curriculum and graduation  
3 requirements for all public schools in accordance with this section.

4 (H) (1) BEGINNING IN THE 2021-2022 SCHOOL YEAR, AND EXCEPT AS  
5 PROVIDED IN PARAGRAPHS (2) AND (3) OF THIS SUBSECTION, EACH STUDENT, AS A  
6 REQUIREMENT FOR GRADUATION, SHALL COMPLETE AND SUBMIT:

7 (I) THE FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID  
8 (FAFSA) TO THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION; OR

9 (II) THE MARYLAND STATE FINANCIAL AID APPLICATION  
10 (MSFAA) TO THE MARYLAND HIGHER EDUCATION COMMISSION.

11 (2) A STUDENT OR THE PARENT OR LEGAL GUARDIAN OF A MINOR  
12 STUDENT MAY SUBMIT TO THE COUNTY BOARD A FORM SIGNED BY THE STUDENT OR  
13 THE PARENT OR LEGAL GUARDIAN OF THE MINOR STUDENT STATING THAT THE  
14 STUDENT UNDERSTANDS THE FAFSA OR MSFAA APPLICATION AND DECLINES TO  
15 COMPLETE AND SUBMIT THE FAFSA OR MSFAA.

16 (3) A COUNTY BOARD SHALL WAIVE THE REQUIREMENT IN  
17 PARAGRAPH (1) OF THIS SUBSECTION IF:

18 (I) 1. A STUDENT COMPLETES ALL OTHER REQUIREMENTS  
19 FOR GRADUATION IN THIS SECTION; AND

20 2. THE STUDENT'S PRINCIPAL ATTESTS THAT THE  
21 STUDENT HAS MADE A GOOD FAITH EFFORT TO COMPLETE THE FAFSA OR MSFAA;  
22 OR

23 (II) A PARENT OR LEGAL GUARDIAN OF A STUDENT REQUESTS A  
24 WAIVER DUE TO EXTENUATING CIRCUMSTANCES.

25 (4) (I) THE DEPARTMENT SHALL ADOPT REGULATIONS TO  
26 IMPLEMENT THE REQUIREMENTS OF THIS SUBSECTION.

27 (II) THE REGULATIONS ADOPTED UNDER THIS PARAGRAPH  
28 SHALL INCLUDE GUIDELINES TO ENSURE THAT EACH STUDENT RECEIVES  
29 ADEQUATE SUPPORT IN COMPLETING AND SUBMITTING THE FAFSA OR MSFAA.

30 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, on or before July 1 each year,  
31 beginning in 2022 and ending in 2027, each county board shall report to the Senate  
32 Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs Committee and the House Committee on

1 Ways and Means, in accordance with § 2–1257 of the State Government Article:

2 (1) the number of students who completed and submitted the FAFSA or  
3 the MSFAA in the immediately preceding school year;

4 (2) the number of students who declined to complete and submit the  
5 FAFSA or the MSFAA in the immediately preceding school year; and

6 (3) the number of students who received a waiver under this Act in the  
7 immediately preceding school year.

8 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect  
9 October 1, 2020.
