10. Description and Purpose of Organiza			

Since our inception in 1932, the mission of the Historical Society of Cecil County, Maryland has been to collect, preserve and interpret artifacts relevant to our county. We operate as a non-profit entity and rely on volunteers to fulfill our objectives. We are located in a Cecil County Government owned building along with the Cecil County Arts Council and the Cecil Land Trust. The Society has no paid staff and the bulk of our annual budget is generated from membership dues, donations and a modest amount from marriage license fees. The Society is considered the official repository for Cecil County's historical records.

## **11. Description and Purpose of Project** (Limit length to visible area)

Restoration of Rev. Duke Log Cabin included: many logs are rotted due to age and water damage; openings where the outside can be seen from inside the cabin; a portion of the floor has collapsed in the fireplace room due to a rotten floor joist; steps to the second floor are separated from the floor planks of the first floor; missing chinking between logs; floor slopes in school room; numerous soft spots in the floor everywhere; worsening bow in the back wall; window frames are separating from log walls. The inward sagging is putting pressure on the corner interlocking logs putting them in danger of giving way. The log cabin is a key component of our museum that is used as a living history museum with historical interpretation and special events emphasizing the life of the cabin, its historic occupant, and Cecil County. Part of the curriculum will also be a class reviewing the documents that created this country.

## 28. Comments

Since 1970, an historic log cabin has resided in the backyard of the Historical Society of Cecil County. The cabin began life on Bow Street in Elkton around 1800. It's historical significance is due to the fact that it was once the home of the Rev. William Duke who used it for both his residence and his own school. Rev. Duke was an Episcopal Priest and the school master of at least 4 schools, one of which was the Elkton Academy.

As in any restoration, we dont know what other issues may lurk behind interior walls, the flooring, and the roof. We do know that without substantial repairs, the cabins long life may soon come to an end. It is the societys vision that, if restored, the cabin will once again serve as a living history museum. We see Rev. Duke himself, strolling the rooms of his former home, telling the story of his life, that of his family, and the students he taught. The site and sound of school children scrambling through the cabin would once more echo off the walls of the ancient structure as the students size-up the school masters and student desks, check out where the Dukes cooked meals, slept, and read by the fireplace long ago. These are just a few of the learning opportunities for the next generation of children and adults as we endeavor to pass on this rich history, unique to Cecil County. As noted, the cabins history is rich and the cost to repair it will be equally rich. Judging from the relatively quick advance of the cabins structural issues, we dont have much time.
