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State Department of Education - School Discipline - Data Collection

3 FOR the purpose of requiring the State Department of Education to disaggregate certain 4 discipline-related data in an electronic spreadsheet format for the Department's 5 website; requiring certain discipline-related data to be available as a data download; 6 requiring the Department to provide certain discipline—related data to the public in 7 an accessible electronic spreadsheet format; requiring the Department to report 8 certain information to the Governor and the General Assembly each year; requiring 9 the Department to lower a risk ratio used to identify a school's disproportional 10 disciplinary practices; requiring the Department to report disproportionality data for 11 high-suspending schools; requiring the Department to include certain schools and 12 programs in a calculation of disproportionality data; defining a certain term; and generally relating to the collection of discipline-related data by the State 13 Department of Education. 14


