- 4 FOR the purpose of altering requirements relating to participation in the Maryland Transit 5 Administration's Disabled Reduced Fare Program by certain opioid treatment 6 programs by requiring the Administration to allow opioid treatment programs to 7 certify eligibility for and issue identification cards and monthly transit passes to qualifying patients; requiring rather than authorizing participating opioid 8 9 treatment programs to issue the identification cards and transit passes to patients on-site; making certain conforming changes to certain regulatory requirements; 10 11 making a stylistic change; and generally relating to the Maryland Transit 12 Administration and transit passes for patients of opioid treatment programs.

- 18 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
- 19 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

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- 22 (a) (1) The Administration shall [make available to] ALLOW opioid treatment
- 23 programs TO CERTIFY ELIGIBILITY AND ISSUE IDENTIFICATION CARDS AND monthly
- 24 transit passes that ARE:

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- 1 (i) [Are for] **FOR** use by patients of opioid treatment programs who 2 qualify for the Administration's Disabled Reduced Fare Program; and
- 3 (ii) [May be issued] **ISSUED** to patients [on site] **ON-SITE** at **PARTICIPATING** opioid treatment programs by opioid treatment program staff.
 - (2) The transit passes issued under paragraph (1) of this subsection shall be made available at a reduced price that reflects the price of a monthly pass issued under the Disabled Reduced Fare Program as of October 1, 2020, less any cost savings to the Administration that result from having participating opioid treatment programs issuing transit passes directly to patients.
- 10 (b) The Administration shall adopt regulations to establish the process by which 11 participating opioid treatment programs [may] CERTIFY ELIGIBILITY AND issue 12 IDENTIFICATION CARDS AND transit passes under this section.
- 13 (c) On or before December 1, 2021, and on or before December 1 each year thereafter, the Administration, in consultation with participating opioid treatment program providers, shall submit a report to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1257 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly on the status of the implementation of the requirements under this section.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect October 1, 2021.
