## A BILL ENTITLED

## 1 AN ACT concerning

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## Workgroup on Public Water Access

3 FOR the purpose of establishing the Workgroup on Public Water Access; specifying the 4 purpose of the Workgroup; providing for the composition, chair, and staffing of the 5 Workgroup; prohibiting a member of the Workgroup from receiving certain 6 compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain expenses; establishing 7 certain subcommittees of the Workgroup; requiring the Workgroup to meet at least 8 a certain number of times each year and on a regular basis; requiring the Workgroup 9 to study and make recommendations regarding certain matters; requiring the Workgroup to submit an interim report and a final report to certain committees of 10 11 the General Assembly on or before certain dates; requiring the final report to include 12 certain information and recommendations; requiring the Governor to include in the 13 annual budget bill for a certain year an appropriation of the Chesapeake Bay Trust 14 to be used for a certain purpose; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to the Workgroup on Public Water Access. 15

16 Preamble

WHEREAS, The COVID-19 pandemic has demonstrated the importance of and need for more and better access to public green spaces and public water to protect and support the health of all Marylanders; and

WHEREAS, The Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries, the Atlantic Coastal Bays, and the scenic western waterways remain some of our State's greatest assets and must continue to be easily accessible for the enjoyment of all Marylanders; and

WHEREAS, Many Marylanders do not have equal access to our State's waterways, and groups that have faced historical social and economic inequities deserve equitable access; and

WHEREAS, Maryland is home to 7,719 miles of shoreline, but only 629 public water



1 access sites statewide; and

WHEREAS, Citizens have a greater sense of responsibility for preserving and restoring our natural resources when those resources are prevalent and easily accessible to everyone, thereby creating significantly more stakeholders; and

WHEREAS, The federal Great American Outdoors Act was signed into law in August a 2020 and ensures a significant increase in funding to the federal Land and Water Conservation Fund; and

- WHEREAS, Increased demand, the benefits to public health, and the need for environmental justice necessitate a workgroup of diverse stakeholders to recommend direct actions that State and local governments can take to expand public water access opportunities; now, therefore,
- SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 13 That:
- 14 (a) There is a Workgroup on Public Water Access.
- 15 (b) The purpose of the Workgroup is to:
- 16 (1) convene a working group of diverse stakeholders;
- 17 (2) make recommendations to increase public water access; and
- 18 (3) consider the benefits of public water access on public health and 19 environmental justice.
- 20 (c) The Workgroup consists of the following members:
- 21 (1) the Secretary of Transportation, or the Secretary's designee;
- 22 (2) one representative of the Office of the Attorney General, designated by 23 the Attorney General;
- 24 (3) one representative of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), designated by the Maryland State Conference of NAACP;
- 26 (4) one representative of the Maryland Environmental Trust (MET), 27 designated by the Director of MET;
- 28 (5) one representative of the Chesapeake Conservancy, designated by the 29 President of the Chesapeake Conservancy;
- 30 (6) one representative of Blue Water Baltimore, designated by the 31 Executive Director of Blue Water Baltimore;

- 1 (7) one representative of the Maryland Recreation and Parks Association 2 (MRPA), designated by the Executive Director of MRPA;
- 3 (8) one representative of GreenLatinos, designated by the President of 4 GreenLatinos;
- 5 (9) one representative of the Arc of Central Chesapeake Region, designated 6 by the President of the Arc of Central Chesapeake Region;
- 7 (10) one representative of the Commission on Environmental Justice and 8 Sustainable Communities (CEJSC), designated by the Chair of CEJSC;
- 9 (11) one representative of the Maryland/DC chapter of the Nature 10 Conservancy, designated by the Executive Director of the Maryland/DC chapter of the 11 Nature Conservancy;
- 12 (12) one representative of The Trust for Public Land, designated by the 13 President of The Trust;
- 14 (13) one representative of ShoreRivers, designated by the President of ShoreRivers;
- 16 (14) one representative of the League of Conservation Voters (LCV), designated by the President of LCV;
- 18 (15) one representative of the Coastal Conservation Association Maryland, 19 designated by the Executive Director of the Association;
- 20 (16) one representative of the Chesapeake Bay Commission (CBC), designated by the Executive Director of CBC;
- 22 (17) one representative of the National Park Service, designated by the 23 National Park Service's Regional Director for Region 1;
- 24 (18) one representative of the Marine Trades Association of Maryland 25 (MTAM), designated by the President of MTAM;
- 26 (19) one representative of the Maryland Park Service, designated by the 27 Superintendent of the Maryland Park Service;
- 28 (20) one representative of the Critical Area Commission for the Chesapeake 29 and Atlantic Coastal Bays, designated by the Chair of the Commission;
- 30 (21) one representative of the Gunpowder Valley Conservancy, designated 31 by the Executive Director of the Conservancy;

1 one representative of the Maryland Municipal League (MML) who is a (22)2 mayor, designated by MML; 3 one representative of the Maryland Association of Counties (MACO) who is a council member, designated by MACO: 4 5 one representative of the Maryland Public Access, Water Trails, and 6 Recreation Planning Program, designated by the Director of the Program; and 7 the following members appointed by the Executive Director of the 8 Chesapeake Bay Trust: 9 one representative from an outdoor recreation business; (i) 10 (ii) one citizen: 11 (iii) two representatives from underrepresented groups who enjoy 12 passive outdoor activities, such as picnicking; 13 (iv) one representative from the kayak community; 14 one representative from the paddle board community; (v) 15 (vi) one representative from a county park department; and 16 one representative from a municipal park department. (vii) 17 (d) To the extent practicable, the membership of the Workgroup shall reflect the racial, ethnic, and gender diversity of the State. 18 19 (e) The Workgroup shall elect by majority vote a chair from among its members. 20 The Chesapeake Bay Trust shall provide staff for the Workgroup. (f) A member of the Workgroup: 21 (g) 22 (1) may not receive compensation as a member of the Workgroup; but 23 is entitled to reimbursement for expenses under the Standard State 24Travel Regulations, as provided in the State budget. 25 (h) The Workgroup is composed of the following subcommittees: 26(1) municipal and county opportunities subcommittee; activation subcommittee; 27(2)

1 financing subcommittee, which will focus on creative financing options, (3)2 such as land trusts and tax incentives; and 3 **(4)** connectivity subcommittee, which will focus on increasing opportunities 4 connecting public with public water access and examining transportation—related barriers to connecting the public with public water access. 5 6 The Workgroup shall meet: (i) 7 (1) at least two times each year; and on a regular basis as determined by the Workgroup. 8 **(2)** 9 To accomplish its purpose, the Workgroup shall: (j) 10 (1) examine current public water access opportunities, including: 11 (i) the quality of public water access; 12 (ii) the activities for which public water access is used; 13 the geographic diversity and affordability of public water access (iii) locations throughout the State; 14 the activities available at and around public water access 15 (iv) 16 locations: and the equity of the distribution of and access to public water access 17 (v) 18 locations throughout the State; 19 (2)study whether public water access opportunities can be increased 20 through: 21(i) the conservation of land for public use; 22(ii) coordination with federal agencies; and 23opening more areas for public water access; (iii) 24study and recommend infrastructure upgrades that will increase the availability of public water access; 2526 explore new water access opportunities, with a focus on accessibility 27and transportation availability; and 28 develop a list of policy tools that State and local governments may use

to expand public water access opportunities, including:
