#### Child Custody - Legal Decision-Making and Parenting Time

FOR the purpose of repealing references to the terms "child custody" and "visitation" in certain instances and substituting the terms "legal decision-making" and "parenting 4 time" in certain instances; authorizing the court, in determining certain legal decision—making authority and parenting time in certain child custody proceedings, to consider certain factors; authorizing the court to award joint legal decision-making to both parents or make other modifications to a custody or visitation order under certain circumstances; prohibiting a parent from unilaterally making certain decisions concerning a child without agreement of the other parent or order of the court under certain circumstances; and generally relating to child custody, visitation, legal decision-making, and parenting time.

[In any custody or visitation proceeding, if] IF the court determines that a party to a custody or visitation order OR LEGAL DECISION—MAKING OR PARENTING—TIME ORDER has unjustifiably denied or interfered with [visitation] THE RIGHTS granted by [a custody or visitation] THE order, the court may, in addition to any other remedy available to the court and in a manner consistent with the best interests of the child, take any or all of the following actions:

- (1) order that the [visitation] **PARENTING TIME** be rescheduled;

- 26 (3) If the court orders that notice be given to the other party, a mailing of 27 the notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the last known address of the other 28 party shall be deemed sufficient to comply with the notice requirement.
- 29 (4) If either party files a petition regarding a proposed relocation within 20 days of the written notice of the relocation required by paragraph (1) of this subsection, the court shall set a hearing on the petition on an expedited basis.
  - (b) On a showing that notice would expose the child or [either] A party to abuse

as defined in § 4–501 of this article or for any other good cause the court shall waive the notice required by this section.

- 3 (c) If [either] A party is required to relocate in less than the 90-day period specified in the notice requirement, the court may consider as a defense to any action brought for a violation of the notice requirement that:
- 6 (1) relocation was necessary due to financial or other extenuating 7 circumstances; and
- 8 (2) the required notice was given within a reasonable time after learning 9 of the necessity to relocate.

- 28 AND PROTECTION FROM EXPOSURE TO CONFLICT AND VIOLENCE; AND
- 29 (3) PROVIDE FOR AN EXPEDITIOUS, THOUGHTFUL, AND CONSISTENT
- 30 PROCESS FOR DECISION-MAKING BY COURTS TO PROTECT THE BEST INTEREST OF
- 31 CHILDREN.

- 16 PROTECTION FROM CONFLICT AND VIOLENCE;

  6 THE OTHER PARENT OR PARENTS OR ORDER OF THE COURT, MAY UNILATERALLY
  7 MAKE MAJOR DECISIONS INVOLVING THE CHILD'S HEALTH, EDUCATION, RELIGION,
  8 CULTURE, OR MEDICAL CARE OR ANY OTHER MATTER OF MAJOR SIGNIFICANCE
  9 CONCERNING THE CHILD'S LIFE OR WELFARE.

- 11 (A) THE COURT MAY MODIFY, IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF
  12 THIS SUBTITLE, A CHILD CUSTODY OR VISITATION ORDER OR A LEGAL
  13 DECISION-MAKING OR PARENTING-TIME ORDER IF THE COURT DETERMINES THAT
  14 THERE HAS BEEN A MATERIAL CHANGE IN CIRCUMSTANCES SINCE THE ISSUANCE OF
  15 THE ORDER THAT RELATES TO THE NEEDS OF THE CHILD OR THE ABILITY OF THE
  16 PARENTS TO MEET THOSE NEEDS AND SUCH MODIFICATION IS IN THE BEST
  17 INTEREST OF THE CHILD.
