28 29 30	(3) examine short-term solutions to address immediate needs for the shortages identified in item (1) of this subsection while ensuring the safety of Maryland patients by:

- 1 (i) determining which health occupations boards have backlogs of 2 applicants for licensure and certification;
- 3 (ii) determining whether expediting or streamlining the licensing or 4 certification process for specific health occupations is a viable option;
- 5 (iii) determining whether implementing additional temporary 6 licensure or certification for specific health occupations is a viable option; and

- 20 (4) examine future health care workforce needs as populations age 21 including by region and spoken language;
- 22 (5) examine what changes are needed to enhance incentives for individuals 23 to enter and stay in the health care workforce in the State, including changes to high school 24 curricula, mid–career transition programs, State tax incentives, grant programs, enhanced 25 benefits, tuition subsidies, and potential rate increases;
- 26 (6) examine ways to facilitate career advancement and retention by 27 identifying and elevating career ladders and programs for on-the-job advancement, 28 particularly for low-wage employees;
- 29 (7) examine the special needs of the rural health care system in the State 30 and methods for recruiting and retaining workers in rural areas;
