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Career and Technical Education Committee – Alterations

3 FOR the purpose of adding two members to the Career and Technical Education 4 Committee; altering the committee's <u>Committee's</u> duties and authorized actions to include the perspective of career colleges and skilled trade organizations; requiring $\mathbf{5}$ 6 the committee Committee to develop and provide to guidance counselors and public 7 schools in the State a certain list; transferring the Committee from a unit within the 8 Governor's Workforce Development Board to an independent unit within the Maryland Department of Labor; repealing the requirement that a member of the 9 Career and Technical Education Committee also be a member of the Governor's 10 Workforce Development Board; and generally relating to the Career and Technical 11

- 12 Education Committee.

 other key stakeholders; and
