8 (B) ON OR BEFORE JANUARY 1, 2023, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL SUBMIT 9 THE <u>PLAN PLANS</u> TO THE GOVERNOR AND, IN ACCORDANCE WITH § 2–1257 OF THE 10 STATE GOVERNMENT ARTICLE, THE CHAIRS OF THE SENATE BUDGET AND 11 TAXATION COMMITTEE, THE SENATE EDUCATION, HEALTH, AND ENVIRONMENTAL 12 AFFAIRS COMMITTEE, THE SENATE FINANCE COMMITTEE, THE HOUSE 13 APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE, AND THE HOUSE HEALTH AND GOVERNMENT 14 OPERATIONS COMMITTEE.

15 (C) BEGINNING IN FISCAL YEAR 2024, THE GOVERNOR SHALL INCLUDE IN 16 THE ANNUAL BUDGET BILL SUFFICIENT FUNDS TO CARRY OUT THIS SECTION.

17 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 18 October 1, 2022.
