18	SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
19	That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

22	(d) (1) In this subsection, "basic cost" as to each county, means the average
23	amount spent by the county from county, State, and federal sources for the public education
24	of a nonhandicapped child. "Basic cost" does not include amounts specifically allocated and

- 1 (2) As provided in paragraphs (3) and (4) of this subsection, the State and 2 the counties shall share collectively in the cost of educating children with disabilities in 3 nonpublic programs under § 8–406 of this subtitle.
- 4 (3) (i) Subject to the limitation under subparagraph (ii) of this 5 paragraph, for each of these children domiciled in the county, the county shall contribute 6 for each placement the sum of:
- 7 1. The local share of the basic cost;
- 8 2. An additional amount equal to 200 percent of the basic 9 cost; and
- 3. A. For fiscal year 2009, an additional amount equal to 20 percent of the approved cost or reimbursement in excess of the sum of items 1 and 2 of
- 12 this subparagraph; and
- B. For fiscal year 2010 and each subsequent fiscal year thereafter, an additional amount equal to 30 percent of the approved cost or reimbursement in excess of the sum of items 1 and 2 of this subparagraph.

- 1 (4) THE ADDITIONAL FUNDING UNDER PARAGRAPH (3) OF THIS SUBSECTION SHALL BE PAID FOR BY THE STATE AND THE COUNTY IN THE SAME PROPORTION AS THE COSTS PAID UNDER SUBSECTION (D) OF THIS SECTION.
- 4 (5) FUNDING FOR OTHER COMPONENTS OF THE NONPUBLIC 5 EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM MAY NOT BE REDUCED TO PROVIDE TEACHER SALARIES IN 6 ACCORDANCE WITH THIS SUBSECTION.
- 7 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 8 1, 2022.
