10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)							
The mission of Rainbow Community Development Center is to build better lives for those in need by providing safety-net services: Food Pantry (our largest program) provides healthy food for those facing food insecurity; stable homes by providing rental assistance to prevent evictions and assistance with prevention of utility cutoffs; as well as providing temporary short-term shelter for the homeless. Additionally, we provide job search and resume preparation.							

## 11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

A collaboration has been formed among multiple food provider agencies to provide shared cold storage. The unit will hold 10 frozen pallets and 22 refrigerated pallets, allowing use of electric pallet jacks for ease of transport and storage and requires us to build an electrical power grid connection. The storage unit will support the creation of a new shared cold storage space that will benefit our work and our food provider partners operating in this district. This will bring innovation and efficiency for food distribution, while allowing us to provide more and better produce plus proteins to our clients. Our goal is to reduce food waste while increasing food access points for providers and clients.

## 28. Comments

This project is a collaborative effort with the District 20 food provider partners. The CHI Centers will provide external space to build the Cold Storage Unit with approval of Montgomery County. The proposed Solar Cool Cube is an expandable walk-in refrigeration system that can be converted to run off solar and be grid-tied to save money and to sell excess energy to the local utility, thereby reducing cost and minimizing electricity.

In collaboration with the food provider partners, a grant was secured from the Greater Washington Community Foundation for food security; in which \$98,000 will be applied to the Cold Storage unit.

In addition to Rainbow, there are 5 partner agencies that this project will support: The East County Hub, MANNA Food Satellite, Mt. Jezreel Food Pantry, Guru Nanak Foundation of America, Adventist Community Services and A Place of Hope. In addition to the Food Provider agencies listed above, we share excess food donations with shelters, senior living homes and Sober Houses.

Each month Rainbow turns away about 10,000 pounds of donated food due to lack of adequate cold storage and discards an average of 3,000 pounds of fresh produce due to spoilage. Our partner agencies lack adequate cold storage capacity as well.

Having adequate cold storage will reduce waste and allow us to share more food donations with partner agencies for their food distributions. These food provider- groups will be able to provide healthier food options and more food varieties; as well as increase the number of people served. This will also provide safe food storage for items requiring refrigeration for our partner agencies that lack refrigeration storage.

Rainbow provides a 12-14 day supply of groceries to clients per visit, including foods from all USDA recommended food groups. This project will allow our partner food provider agencies provide fresh food to their clients as well, and increase the quantity of food distributed.

With this project, we plan to serve about 40% more people in this district through our collaborative efforts.
