10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)							

The Baltimore County Dept. of Recreation and Parks provides a wide range of recreational opportunities to the citizens and visitors of the County, through hundreds of parks and recreation sites countywide. Recreational facilities are provided at parks, leased recreation sites, and public school recreation centers-- the latter through a joint-use agreement whereby many indoor and outdoor facilities at public schools are used for both educational and recreational purposes. The Department administers a wide range of parks, from countywide parks up to 1,100-acres in size, to small neighborhood "pocket parks" of less than an acre. The parks feature a wide variety of facilities and free-time recreational opportunities, and hundreds of organized recreation programs are provided through 45 non-profit recreation and parks councils formed by volunteers.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

The proposed project consists of the design and construction of park renovations and enhancements at the 16.4-acre Holt Park and Center for the Arts, in the Overlea-Fullerton community of eastern Baltimore County. A wide range of renovations and improvements are proposed, to repair, update, and expand upon existing indoor and outdoor recreation spaces at the park. Many of the park's facilities are old and worn, and no longer effectively serve the growing recreational programs and daily general/unscheduled use of the park. In some cases, facilities require full-fledged replacement. Other proposed work activities include accessibility related improvements and a potential trail extension from the park to the Northeast Regional Trail and nearby recreation sites.

28. Comments

Holt Park serves as an oasis among the heavily populated and developed Overlea-Fullerton community, being a park that offers more "passive" recreational opportunities, including nature, arts, and cultural programs. Facilities and amenities at the park include an arts center used for a variety of recreational programming, multiple old cabins including some that are not presently usable for anything but storage, paved and natural surface paths and trails, a gazebo, garden and trellis, amphitheater, outdoor program area with firepit, and parking. Having been in the County's park system for just over fifty years, the park is showing plentiful signs of its age, and is in need of a wide range of renovations and enhancements. The park has long been a cherished escape for the surrounding community, and expanded organized recreation programming has brought in a growing, diverse population of park patrons. Like most parks, Holt Park has seen a sizeable increase in overall use since the onset of COVID-19, including individuals who experienced the park through remote opportunities provided during the pandemic. The Department of Recreation and Parks would utilize grant funding to not only refurbish, replace, or improve outdoor facilities, but to renovate the park's structures to make them both usable and accessible.
