Child in Need of Assistance - Neglect - Marijuana Use

This bill alters the definition of "neglect" in statutory provisions that govern child in need of assistance (CINA) proceedings. The bill specifies that neglect does not include the mere use of marijuana by any parent or individual who has permanent or temporary care or custody or responsibility for supervision of the child unless, as a result of the use of marijuana (1) the child's health or welfare is harmed or placed at substantial risk of harm or (2) the child has suffered mental injury or been placed at substantial risk of mental injury.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: The bill is not anticipated to materially affect State finances or operations.

Local Effect: The bill is not anticipated to materially affect local government finances or operations.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: A CINA is a child who requires court intervention because (1) the child has been abused or neglected, has a developmental disability, or has a mental disorder and (2) the child's parents, guardian, or custodian is unable or unwilling to give proper care and attention to the child and the child's needs. "Neglect" means the leaving of a child unattended or other failure to give proper care and attention to a child by any parent or individual who has permanent or temporary care or custody or responsibility for supervision of the child under circumstances that indicate (1) that the child's health or

welfare is harmed or placed at substantial risk of harm or (2) that the child has suffered mental injury or has been placed at substantial risk of mental injury. Statutory provisions outline numerous requirements for CINA proceedings.
