## Pesticide Registration Pesticides - PFAS Testing - Requirements Study

- 3 FOR the purpose of prohibiting, beginning on a certain date, the Secretary of Agriculture from registering a pesticide for use against mosquitoes in the State unless the 4 distributor of the pesticide submits to the Department of Agriculture certain test 5 6 results and a certain affidavit; prohibiting, beginning on a certain date, the Secretary 7 from registering a posticide for use in the State unless the distributor of the posticide 8 submits to the Department certain test results and a certain affidavit; and generally 9 relating to the registration of pesticides in the State requiring the Department of Agriculture, in consultation with certain State and federal agencies, to study the use 10 of perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) in pesticides in the State: 11 requiring the Department to report certain findings and recommendations to the 12 Governor and certain committees of the General Assembly on or before a certain 13 14 date; and generally relating to the use of PFAS in pesticides in the State.
