- $\mathbf{5}$ FOR the purpose of increasing the maximum number of speed monitoring systems that 6 may be placed and used on Maryland Route 210 (Indian Head Highway) in Prince 7 George's County; repealing <u>altering</u> a certain requirement that the State Highway 8 Administration, in conjunction with the Prince George's County Department of 9 Public Works and Transportation, perform a certain examination of Maryland Route 10 210 in Prince George's County and annually report certain findings, recommendations, and information to the Governor and the General Assembly; 11 repealing a provision of law terminating extending the termination date for a 12provision of law granting the authority to place speed monitoring systems on 13 Maryland Route 210 in Prince George's County; and generally relating to the 14 placement and use of speed monitoring systems on Maryland Route 210 (Indian 15Head Highway) in Prince George's County. 16

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1 (8) "Speed monitoring system" means a device with one or more motor 2 vehicle sensors producing recorded images of motor vehicles traveling at speeds at least 12 3 miles per hour above the posted speed limit.

4 (b) (1) (i) A speed monitoring system may not be used in a local jurisdiction 5 under this section unless its use is authorized by the governing body of the local jurisdiction 6 by local law enacted after reasonable notice and a public hearing.

7 (vi) This section applies to a violation of this subtitle recorded by a 8 speed monitoring system that meets the requirements of this subsection and has been 9 placed:

10 1. In Montgomery County or Prince George's County, on a 11 highway in a residential district, as defined in § 21–101 of this title, with a maximum posted 12 speed limit of 35 miles per hour, which speed limit was established using generally accepted 13 traffic engineering practices;

- 1415 miles per hour;2. In a school zone with a posted speed limit of at least 20
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- 3. In Prince George's County:
- A. Subject to subparagraph (vii)1 of this paragraph, on
 Maryland Route 210 (Indian Head Highway); or
- B. On that part of a highway located within the grounds of an institution of higher education as defined in § 10–101(h) of the Education Article, or within one-half mile of the grounds of a building or property used by the institution of higher education where generally accepted traffic and engineering practices indicate that motor vehicle, pedestrian, or bicycle traffic is substantially generated or influenced by the institution of higher education;
- 4. Subject to subparagraph (vii)2 of this paragraph, on
 Interstate 83 in Baltimore City; or
- 5. In Anne Arundel County, on Maryland Route 175 (Jessup Road) between the Maryland Route 175/295 interchange and the Anne Arundel County–Howard County line.
- 30 (vii) 1. Not more than [three] 10 SIX MOBILE OR STATIONARY
 31 speed monitoring systems may be placed on Maryland Route 210 (Indian Head Highway).
