6 FOR the purpose of <u>authorizing the Attorney General to direct that an Opioid Restitution</u> 7 Fund Advisory Council committee be formed if required by a court or administrative 8 order or settlement agreement entered into by the Attorney General; requiring the 9 Maryland Department of Health to allow certain entities provided opioid overdose 10 reversal drugs by the Department under the Overdose Response Program to choose 11 the formulation or dosage of opioid overdose reversal drugs approved by the federal 12 Food and Drug Administration with which the entity is to be provided; applying the 13 requirement that the appropriation and distribution of funds in the Opioid 14Restitution Fund that were received in accordance with certain opioid-related final distributor and settlement agreements be made in a certain manner to funds 1516 received in accordance with any opioid-related court or administrative judgment or 17settlement agreement; and generally relating to the Overdose Response Program 18 opioids.
