C8 3lr2126 By: Delegates Sample-Hughes and Adams Introduced and read first time: February 6, 2023 Assigned to: Environment and Transportation Committee Report: Favorable with amendments House action: Adopted Read second time: March 11, 2023 CHAPTER AN ACT concerning Rural Maryland Prosperity Investment Fund – Revisions and Sunset Repeal **Allocation of Grants** (Rural Communities Improvement Act of 2023) FOR the purpose of altering certain allocations of disbursements from the Rural Maryland Prosperity Investment Fund; authorizing the allocation of grants from the Rural Maryland Prosperity Investment Fund for certain business and workforce development activities; requiring the Executive Committee of the Executive Board for the Rural Maryland Council to agree to a reallocation of funds between grant categories before the Maryland Agricultural Education and Rural Development Assistance Board may reallocate the funds; requiring the Governor, beginning in a certain fiscal year, to appropriate a certain amount of money to the Fund annually; repealing the termination date of certain provisions of law establishing the Fund; and generally relating to the Rural Maryland Prosperity Fund. BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments, Article – State Finance and Procurement Section 2-207 Annotated Code of Maryland (2021 Replacement Volume and 2022 Supplement) BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments, Chapter 621 of the Acts of the General Assembly of 2006, as amended by Chapters 469 and 470 of the Acts of the General Assembly of 2014
