<u>Blueprint for Maryland's Future – Publicly Funded Prekindergarten, Maryland</u> <u>Consortium on Coordinated Community Supports, and Career Ladder –</u> <u>Alterations</u>

- 7FOR the purpose of altering the duties of an assistant principal on the career ladder created 8 by the Blueprint for Maryland's Future; delaying the date on which county boards of 9 education must select certain experts from the career ladder to write curriculum and 10 develop model lessons; altering the definition of a "Tier I child" who may be enrolled beginning in a certain school year to a full–day prekindergarten program, to include 11 children with a disability, children who are homeless youths, and children who are 12from homes in which English is not the primary spoken language; to include children 13 who are homeless youths; authorizing certain children to enroll in full-day 14 15prekindergarten programs beginning in a certain school year, and requiring these children to be counted as Tier I children for a certain purpose in a certain school 16 year; altering the membership of the Maryland Consortium on Coordinated 17Community Supports to include a school counselor; and generally relating to publicly 18 funded full-day prekindergarten the Blueprint for Maryland's Future. 19
