1 AN ACT concerning

Environment - Comprehensive Flood Management Grant Program - Funding for <u>Underserved and</u> Overburdened Communities

4 FOR the purpose of requiring a certain percentage of funding provided under the $\mathbf{5}$ comprehensive flood management grant program to be used for projects located in or 6 directly benefitting census tracts with a certain EJ Score benefiting underserved or 7 overburdened communities in certain fiscal years; requiring authorizing the Governor to include in the annual State budget an appropriation for the 8 9 comprehensive flood management grant program of up to a certain amount in certain 10 fiscal years; and generally relating to the comprehensive flood management grant 11 program.
