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## A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Higher Education – Appointment of Secretary and Student**  
3 **Financial Assistance – Alterations**

4 FOR the purpose of providing that the Secretary of Higher Education is appointed by, and  
5 serves at the pleasure of, the Governor; altering eligibility criteria for, and the  
6 process for awards from, the Delegate Howard P. Rawlings Program of Educational  
7 Excellence Awards; altering eligibility criteria for services provided to students  
8 through the Next Generation Scholars of Maryland Program; altering the  
9 administration of the Maryland Community College Promise Scholarship to require  
10 community colleges to award scholarships from the Maryland Community College  
11 Promise Scholarship in place of the Office of Student Financial Assistance within the  
12 Maryland Higher Education Commission; repealing certain provisions of law related  
13 to the intent of the General Assembly for the Commission to be reorganized to  
14 establish the Office of Student Financial Assistance as a separate independent  
15 agency in a certain fiscal year; and generally relating to the appointment of the  
16 Secretary of Higher Education and student financial assistance programs in the  
17 State.

13 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,  
 14 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

15 **Article – Education**

16 11–104.

17 (a) [(1) In accordance with paragraph (2) of this subsection, the] **THE** Governor  
 18 shall appoint, with the advice and consent of the Senate, a Secretary of Higher Education.

19 [(2) (i) The Commission shall submit to the Governor the names of 3  
 20 nominees for the position of Secretary from which the Governor shall make the  
 21 appointment.

22 (ii) The Governor may reject the list and request the Commission to  
 23 submit the names of additional nominees.]

24 (b) (1) The Secretary shall:

25 (i) Select, organize, and direct the staff of the Commission;

26 (ii) Perform the duties the Commission assigns;

27 (iii) See that the policies and decisions of the Commission are carried  
 28 out;

29 (iv) Serve at the pleasure of the [Commission] **GOVERNOR**; and

30 (v) Be a member of the Governor’s Executive Council.

31 (2) (i) After consideration of the recommendations of the Commission,  
 32 the Governor shall include in the annual budget request the salary for the Secretary.

1 (ii) The Secretary is entitled to the salary provided in the State  
2 budget.

4 (a) Subject to subsection (e) of this section, each recipient of a Delegate Howard  
5 P. Rawlings Educational Excellence Award shall:

6 (1) Be accepted for admission in the regular undergraduate program at an  
7 eligible institution or be enrolled in a 2–year associate degree program in which the course  
8 work is acceptable for transfer credit for an accredited baccalaureate program in an eligible  
9 institution;

10 (2) Except as provided in § 18–303.2 of this subtitle, be a resident of this  
11 State;

12 (3) Demonstrate a definite financial need to:

13 (i) For an Educational Assistance Grant, the Office; or

14 (ii) For a Guaranteed Access Grant, the Office or an institution of  
15 higher education that complies with § 18–303.3 of this subtitle; and

16 (4) Accept any other conditions attached to the award.

17 (b) Except as provided in subsection (c) of this section, each recipient of a  
18 Guaranteed Access Grant shall:

19 (1) Have [attained a grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale or its  
20 equivalent at the end of the first semester of the senior year in high school and have]  
21 completed high school or, failing to do so, on the recommendation of the recipient’s high  
22 school principal, provide evidence satisfactory to the Office of extenuating circumstances;

23 (2) [Begin college within 1 year of completing high school or, failing to do  
24 so, provide evidence satisfactory to the Office of extenuating circumstances;

25 (3) Be under the age of 22 years at the time of receiving the first award;

26 (4) Have successfully completed a college preparatory program in high  
27 school;

28 (5)] Enroll in college as a full–time student;

29 [(6)] (3) Subject to subsection (d) of this section, have an annual family  
30 income below a poverty index determined by the Commission; and

1            ~~[(7)] (4)~~        Satisfy any additional criteria the Commission may establish.

2            (c)    (1)    Subject to paragraph (2) of this subsection, an individual who has  
3 successfully obtained a high school diploma by examination under § 11–808 of the Labor  
4 and Employment Article is exempt from the requirements of subsection (b) of this section.

5            (2)    An individual described under paragraph (1) of this subsection is  
6 eligible for a Guaranteed Access Grant if the individual:

7                    (i)    Has scored a passing score of at least 165 per module on the  
8 diploma by examination;

9                    (ii)    [Begins college within 1 year of achieving the score described  
10 under item (i) of this paragraph or, failing to do so, provides evidence satisfactory to the  
11 Office of extenuating circumstances;

12                    (iii)    Is under the age of 22 years at the time of receiving the first  
13 award;

14                    (iv)]    Enrolls in college as a full–time student; and

15                    ~~[(v)] (III)~~    Subject to subsection (d) of this section, has an annual  
16 family income below a poverty index determined by the Commission.

17            (d)    (1)    To determine the annual family income eligibility of an applicant for a  
18 Guaranteed Access Grant, the Office or an institution of higher education that complies  
19 with § 18–303.3 of this subtitle may not consider an amount received by the applicant as  
20 an earned income credit under § 32 of the Internal Revenue Code.

21            (2)    When awarding a Guaranteed Access Grant to a student who  
22 prequalified for the award under subsection (e)(1) or (2) of this section, the Commission  
23 shall use the annual family income determination used when the student prequalified.

24            (e)    (1)    Except as provided in paragraph (2) of this subsection, a student in  
25 grade 7 or grade 8 who applies and qualifies for a Guaranteed Access Grant on the basis of  
26 financial need as established by the Commission shall prequalify for a Guaranteed Access  
27 Grant to be used at the time of enrollment in an institution of higher education by agreeing  
28 in writing, as a secondary and undergraduate student, to:

29                    (i)    Satisfy the attendance policy of the applicable school;

30                    (ii)    [Refrain from substance abuse;

31                    (iii)]    Provide information required by the Commission or the State  
32 Board of Education;

1 [(iv)] (III) Apply for admission to an institution of higher education  
2 during the student's senior year of high school;

3 [(v)] (IV) Complete and file on a timely basis applications for federal  
4 student aid for each year that the student plans to enroll in postsecondary education;

5 [(vi)] (V) Participate in the Next Generation Scholars of Maryland  
6 Program established in § 18–303.1 of this subtitle until the student graduates from high  
7 school and matriculates at an institution of higher education;

8 [(vii)] (VI) Maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.5  
9 on a 4.0 scale or its equivalent; and

10 [(viii)] (VII) Satisfy any other program requirements set by the Office,  
11 the Commission, the State Board of Education, or the State Department of Education.

12 (2) A student in grade 9 or grade 10 shall prequalify for a Guaranteed  
13 Access Grant to be used at the time of enrollment in an institution of higher education if  
14 the student:

15 (i) Otherwise meets the conditions of paragraph (1) of this  
16 subsection; and

17 (ii) 1. Is eligible for free or reduced priced meals; or  
18 2. Attends a school that participates in the U.S. Department  
19 of Agriculture Community Eligibility Provision and the student is identified by:

20 A. Direct certification; or

21 B. Income information provided by the family of the student  
22 to the local school system on an alternative form developed by the Department.

24 (c) The Program shall provide guidance and services to students who qualify for  
25 a Guaranteed Access Grant in accordance with § 18–303(e) of this subtitle **AND STUDENTS**  
26 **WHO QUALIFY TO RECEIVE FREE LUNCH UNDER THE NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH**  
27 **PROGRAM** to assist the students in successfully:

28 (1) Completing a college preparatory curriculum;

29 (2) Graduating from high school;

30 (3) Matriculating at an institution of higher education as defined in §  
31 18–303 of this subtitle; and

1 (4) Making timely progress to complete a degree program.

2 (d) (1) The Department shall:

3 (i) Publicize the Program through community outreach and  
4 marketing materials;

5 (ii) Award grants to nonprofit organizations to administer the  
6 Program;

7 (iii) Solicit applications from nonprofit organizations to administer  
8 the Program in local school systems; and

9 (iv) Give priority to applications:

10 1. From Maryland-based nonprofit organizations; and

11 2. That include business and institution of higher education

12 partners.

13 (2) The Program may continue to provide services to students [when]:

14 (I) **WHEN** they attend an institution of higher education; **OR**

15 (II) **WHO HAVE PARTICIPATED IN THE PROGRAM FOR AT LEAST**  
16 **1 FULL YEAR AND RELOCATE TO ANOTHER COUNTY IN THE STATE THAT DOES NOT**  
17 **PARTICIPATE IN THE PROGRAM.**

19 (a) A public institution of higher education in the State, or a private nonprofit  
20 institution of higher education that is eligible for State aid under § 17-103 of this article,  
21 may verify the eligibility of an applicant for, and on verification of the eligibility administer,  
22 a Guaranteed Access Grant in accordance with this section.

23 (b) An institution may verify:

24 (1) The eligibility of an applicant who:

25 (i) Is identified by the Office as potentially eligible for a Guaranteed  
26 Access Grant under § 18-303 of this subtitle; and

27 (ii) Applies for admission to the institution; or

28 (2) The renewal eligibility of a student who:

1 (i) Received a Guaranteed Access Grant under § 18–303 of this  
2 subtitle in the prior award year; and

3 (ii) Is an admitted student at the institution in the current award  
4 year.

5 (c) An institution shall:

6 (1) Verify that an applicant qualifies for a Guaranteed Access Grant under  
7 the requirements of § 18–303 of this subtitle;

8 (2) Evaluate the applicant’s income eligibility criteria using federal [V1  
9 standard] **STANDARDS FOR** verification and in accordance with the income eligibility  
10 criteria established by the Office;

11 (3) Maintain records used by the institution to determine the eligibility of  
12 applicants for a period of 5 years after the end date of the award year associated with the  
13 student’s last award; and

14 (4) Provide the Commission with an audit, in accordance with rules  
15 adopted by the Commission, to show that awards verified and administered under this  
16 section have been made properly.

17 (d) (1) Subject to paragraph (2) of this subsection, a verification obtained by  
18 an applicant under subsection (b) of this section may be used at any eligible institution  
19 described under § 18–305 of this subtitle.

20 (2) The amount of the Guaranteed Access Grant awarded to an applicant  
21 may be adjusted in accordance with the cost of attendance at the institution at which the  
22 applicant uses the award.

24 (a) In this subtitle the following words have the meanings indicated.

25 (b) “Annual adjusted gross income” means the total of the combined adjusted  
26 gross income of the applicant and the applicant’s parents, or the applicant and the  
27 applicant’s spouse if the applicant is married, as reported on the most recent federal or  
28 State income tax return.

29 (c) **“AWARD” MEANS A SCHOLARSHIP AWARD FROM THE MARYLAND**  
30 **COMMUNITY COLLEGE PROMISE SCHOLARSHIP.**

31 [(c)] (d) “Community college” includes Baltimore City Community College.

1            **[(d)] (E)**        “Local promise scholarship” means a community college scholarship  
2 program in effect on July 1, 2018, that provides a scholarship to any high school senior who  
3 is eligible for enrollment at the community college.

4            **[(e)] (F)**        (1)        “Tuition” means the basic instructional charge for courses offered  
5 at a community college.

6                            (2)        “Tuition” includes any fees for:

7    (i)        Registration;

8    (ii)       Application;

9    (iii)      Administration;

10     (iv)      Laboratory work; and

11     (v)      Other mandatory fees.

12                            (3)        “Tuition” does not include:

13    (i)        Costs associated with the parts of a registered apprenticeship  
14 that take place at a location that is not a community college; or

15    (ii)      Any fees for room and board that are related to an on-campus  
16 residential facility for students.

17 18–3602.

18            (a)        There is a program of Maryland Community College Promise Scholarships in  
19 the State that are awarded under this subtitle.

20            (b)        The purpose of the program is to provide tuition assistance for students to  
21 attend a community college in the State.

22            (c)        The Office AND EACH COMMUNITY COLLEGE shall publicize the availability  
23 of Maryland Community College Promise Scholarships.

24            **(D) THE OFFICE SHALL ALLOCATE MARYLAND COMMUNITY COLLEGE**  
25 **PROMISE SCHOLARSHIP FUNDING TO EACH COMMUNITY COLLEGE IN THE STATE**  
26 **BASED ON THE PROPORTION OF FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT STUDENTS AT EACH**  
27 **COMMUNITY COLLEGE, AS DEFINED IN § 16-305(B)(7) OF THIS ARTICLE, FOR EACH**  
28 **COMMUNITY COLLEGE TO AWARD MARYLAND COMMUNITY COLLEGE PROMISE**  
29 **SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS TO STUDENTS.**

30 18–3603.

1 (a) (1) **(I)** [A student must] **SUBJECT TO SUBPARAGRAPH (II) OF THIS**  
2 **PARAGRAPH, A STUDENT MAY** apply annually to [the Commission] **A MARYLAND**  
3 **COMMUNITY COLLEGE LOCATED IN THE COUNTY OR, IN THE CASE OF A REGIONAL**  
4 **COMMUNITY COLLEGE, IN THE REGION WHERE THE APPLICANT LIVES** to receive a  
5 Maryland Community College Promise Scholarship award.

6 **(II) IF THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE LOCATED IN THE COUNTY OR**  
7 **REGION WHERE THE APPLICANT LIVES DOES NOT OFFER THE DEGREE OR**  
8 **CERTIFICATION PROGRAM IN WHICH THE APPLICANT WANTS TO ENROLL, THE**  
9 **STUDENT MAY APPLY TO THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE OUTSIDE THE COUNTY OR, IN**  
10 **THE CASE OF A REGIONAL COMMUNITY COLLEGE, OUTSIDE THE REGION WHERE THE**  
11 **APPLICANT LIVES TO RECEIVE A MARYLAND COMMUNITY COLLEGE PROMISE**  
12 **SCHOLARSHIP AWARD.**

13 (2) [The Office] **A COMMUNITY COLLEGE** annually shall select eligible  
14 applicants and offer a Maryland Community College Promise Scholarship award to each  
15 selected applicant to be used for tuition at [a] **THE** community college [of the applicant's  
16 choice].

17 (b) An applicant is eligible for a Maryland Community College Promise  
18 Scholarship **AWARD** if the applicant:

19 (1) Is eligible for in-State tuition;

20 (2) Enrolls as a candidate for a vocational certificate, a certificate, or an  
21 associate's degree or participates in a registered apprenticeship after graduating from a  
22 high school or successfully completing a GED in the State:

23 (i) Except as provided in [items (ii) and (iii)] **ITEM (II)** of this item,  
24 at the community college located in the county or, in the case of a regional community  
25 college, in the region, where the applicant lives; **OR**

26 (ii) [If the community college located in the county or region where  
27 the applicant lives does not offer the degree or certification program in which the applicant  
28 wants to enroll, then at any community college in the State that offers the program; or

29 (iii)] At a community college in the State that has an on-campus  
30 residential facility for students;

31 (3) Except as provided in subsection (c)(3) of this section, has earned a  
32 cumulative grade point average of:

33 (i) For an initial award, at least 2.3 on a 4.0 scale or its equivalent  
34 at the end of the first semester or the end of the year of the senior year in high school; or

1 (ii) While enrolled at a community college in the State, at least 2.5  
2 on a 4.0 scale or its equivalent;

3 (4) Has an annual adjusted gross income of not more than:

4 (i) \$100,000 if the applicant is single or resides in a single-parent  
5 household; or

6 (ii) \$150,000 if the applicant is married or resides in a two-parent  
7 household;

8 (5) (i) Enrolls in:

9 1. At least [12] 6 credits per semester at the community  
10 college; or

11 2. A sequence of credit or noncredit courses that leads to  
12 licensure or certification; or

13 (ii) Participates in a registered apprenticeship program; and

14 (6) (i) Timely submits a Free Application for Federal Student Aid  
15 (FAFSA) or any other applications for any State or federal student financial aid, other than  
16 a student loan, for which the applicant may qualify; or

17 (ii) Is ineligible to submit a FAFSA, qualifies for in-State tuition  
18 under § 15-106.8 of this article, and timely submits an application for any State student  
19 financial aid, other than a student loan, for which the applicant may qualify.

20 (c) (1) An applicant who receives any other educational grants or scholarships  
21 that cover the applicant's full cost of attendance at the community college is ineligible to  
22 receive an award under this subtitle.

23 (2) An applicant who has earned a bachelor's degree or an associate's  
24 degree is ineligible to receive an award under this subtitle.

25 (3) An applicant who graduated from high school 5 or more years before  
26 the date of application is not subject to the grade point average requirements established  
27 in subsection (b)(3)(i) of this section for an initial award.

28 (d) On request the community college shall assist an applicant to submit a FAFSA  
29 or any other applications for State or federal student financial aid.

1           **(A) A COMMUNITY COLLEGE SHALL VERIFY THE ELIGIBILITY OF AN**  
2 **APPLICANT FOR A MARYLAND COMMUNITY COLLEGE PROMISE SCHOLARSHIP**  
3 **AWARD IN ACCORDANCE WITH THIS SECTION.**

4           **(B) (1) A COMMUNITY COLLEGE SHALL:**

5                   **(I) VERIFY THAT AN APPLICANT QUALIFIES FOR A MARYLAND**  
6 **COMMUNITY COLLEGE PROMISE SCHOLARSHIP AWARD UNDER THE**  
7 **REQUIREMENTS OF § 18-3603 OF THIS SUBTITLE;**

8                   **(II) EVALUATE THE APPLICANT'S INCOME ELIGIBILITY USING**  
9 **FEDERAL STANDARDS FOR VERIFICATION AND IN ACCORDANCE WITH INCOME**  
10 **ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA ESTABLISHED BY THE OFFICE;**

11                   **(III) MAINTAIN RECORDS USED BY THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE**  
12 **TO DETERMINE THE ELIGIBILITY OF APPLICANTS FOR NOT LESS THAN A PERIOD OF**  
13 **5 YEARS AFTER THE END DATE OF THE AWARD YEAR ASSOCIATED WITH THE**  
14 **STUDENT'S LAST AWARD; AND**

15                   **(IV) PROVIDE THE COMMISSION WITH AN AUDIT, IN**  
16 **ACCORDANCE WITH RULES ADOPTED BY THE COMMISSION, TO SHOW THAT AWARDS**  
17 **VERIFIED AND ADMINISTERED UNDER THIS SECTION HAVE BEEN MADE PROPERLY.**

18           **(2) A VERIFICATION OBTAINED BY AN APPLICANT UNDER**  
19 **PARAGRAPH (1)(I) OF THIS SUBSECTION MAY BE USED AT ANOTHER COMMUNITY**  
20 **COLLEGE.**

21           **(C) (1) THE OFFICE SHALL REVIEW THE AUDIT PROVIDED TO THE**  
22 **COMMISSION UNDER SUBSECTION (B)(1)(IV) OF THIS SECTION NOT LESS THAN ONCE**  
23 **EVERY 3 YEARS TO VERIFY THAT RECIPIENTS MET THE ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS**  
24 **FOR AN AWARD.**

25                   **(2) (I) IF THE OFFICE DETERMINES THAT A COMMUNITY COLLEGE**  
26 **MADE AN INCORRECT AWARD TO AN INELIGIBLE STUDENT, THE COMMUNITY**  
27 **COLLEGE SHALL REMIT TO THE COMMISSION THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF THE AWARD**  
28 **MADE IN ERROR.**

29                   **(II) THE COMMISSION SHALL PAY ALL AMOUNTS RECEIVED**  
30 **UNDER SUBPARAGRAPH (I) OF THIS PARAGRAPH TO THE NEED-BASED STUDENT**  
31 **FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FUND UNDER § 18-107 OF THIS TITLE.**



1 (i) 3 years after first enrolling as a candidate for a vocational  
2 certificate, a certificate, or an associate's degree at a community college in the State; or

3 (ii) The date that the individual is awarded an associate's degree.

4 (2) [The Office] A COMMUNITY COLLEGE may extend the duration of an  
5 award for an allowable interruption of study if the recipient provides to the [Office]  
6 COMMUNITY COLLEGE satisfactory evidence of extenuating circumstances that prevent  
7 the recipient from continuous enrollment.

8 (3) Each recipient may hold the award in accordance with paragraph (1) of  
9 this subsection only if the recipient:

10 (i) Continues to be eligible for in-State tuition;

11 (ii) 1. Continues to enroll in and complete at least [12] 6 credits  
12 per semester, or a sequence of credit or noncredit courses that leads to licensure or  
13 certification, or their equivalent, as determined by the [Office] COMMUNITY COLLEGE; or

14 2. Continues to participate in a registered apprenticeship  
15 program.

16 (iii) Maintains a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.5 on a  
17 4.0 scale or its equivalent for the requisite credit-bearing coursework for the remainder of  
18 the award or, failing to do so, provides to the [Office] COMMUNITY COLLEGE satisfactory  
19 evidence of extenuating circumstances;

20 (iv) Makes satisfactory progress toward a vocational certificate, a  
21 certificate, or an associate's degree;

22 (v) Continues to meet the income limitations under § 18-3603(b)(4)  
23 of this subtitle; and

24 (vi) Continues to timely submit an application under § 18-3603(b)(6)  
25 of this subtitle.

17 with § 18–303.3 of this subtitle] may not consider an amount received by the applicant as  
18 an earned income credit under § 32 of the Internal Revenue Code.

16           **[(d)] (E)**     Beginning in fiscal year 2024 and each fiscal year thereafter, the  
17 Governor shall include in the annual budget bill an appropriation of at least \$112,000,000  
18 for Delegate Howard P. Rawlings Educational Excellence Awards made under this subtitle.

20           (a)     **(1)**     Except as provided in subsection (d) of this section, the Office shall  
21 compile and certify lists for the entire State that rank applicants by financial need **FOR**

29 **AWARD** shall be awarded from the statewide list on the basis of greatest financial need.

31 each individual who applied for a Delegate Howard P. Rawlings Educational Excellence

30 SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, except as provided in Section  
31 4 of this Act, this Act shall take effect July 1, 2023.
