20 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
21 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

22 **Article – Courts and Judicial Proceedings**

23 3–801.

24 (aa) “Sexual molestation or exploitation” includes:

25 (1) Allowing or encouraging a child to engage in:

26 (i) Obscene photography, films, poses, or similar activity;

27 (ii) Pornographic photography, films, poses, or similar activity; or

28 (iii) Prostitution;

29 (2) Incest;

30 (3) Rape;

31 (4) Sexual offense in any degree; and

32 (5) [Unnatural or perverted sexual practices] **ANY OTHER SEXUAL**

1 CONDUCT THAT IS A CRIME.

2 Article – Criminal Law

3 [3–322.

4 (a) A person may not:

5 (1) take the sexual organ of another or of an animal in the person’s mouth;

6 (2) place the person’s sexual organ in the mouth of another or of an animal;

7 or

8 (3) commit another unnatural or perverted sexual practice with another or
9 with an animal.10 (b) A person who violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction
11 is subject to imprisonment not exceeding 10 years or a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or both.

12 (c) A person who violates this section is subject to § 5–106(b) of the Courts Article.

13 (d) An indictment for a violation of this section:

14 (1) is sufficient if it states that the defendant committed an unnatural and
15 perverted sexual practice with a person or animal as applicable; but

16 (2) need not state the particular:

17 (i) unnatural or perverted sexual practice with which the defendant
18 is charged; or19 (ii) manner in which the defendant committed the unnatural or
20 perverted sexual practice.]

21 3–602.

22 (a) (4) (i) “Sexual abuse” means an act that involves sexual molestation or
23 exploitation of a minor, whether physical injuries are sustained or not.

24 (ii) “Sexual abuse” includes:

25 1. incest;

26 2. rape;

27 3. sexual offense in any degree; and

1 distribution; and

2 (3) under circumstances in which the other person had a reasonable
3 expectation that the image would remain private.

6 (a) (1) In this section the following words have the meanings indicated.

7 (2) “Qualifying offense” means:

8 (i) unnatural or perverted sexual practice under § 3–322 of the
9 Criminal Law Article, **AS THAT OFFENSE EXISTED BEFORE OCTOBER 1, 2023**;

10 (b) A person convicted of a qualifying offense may file a motion to vacate the
11 judgment if the person’s participation in the offense was a direct result of being a victim of
12 human trafficking.

13 10–105.

14 (a) A person who has been charged with the commission of a crime, including a
15 violation of the Transportation Article for which a term of imprisonment may be imposed,
16 or who has been charged with a civil offense or infraction, except a juvenile offense, may
17 file a petition listing relevant facts for expungement of a police record, court record, or other
18 record maintained by the State or a political subdivision of the State if:

19 (11) except as provided in subsection (a–1) of this section, the person was
20 convicted of a crime and the act on which the conviction was based is no longer a crime;

21 (a–1) An expungement may not be obtained under subsection (a)(11) of this section
22 for a conviction for sodomy as that offense existed before October 1, 2020, **OR A VIOLATION**
23 **OF § 3–322 OF THE CRIMINAL LAW ARTICLE AS THAT OFFENSE EXISTED BEFORE**
24 **OCTOBER 1, 2023**, where the offense was committed:

25 (1) without consent;

26 (2) with a minor under the age of 16;

27 (3) with anyone the individual could not marry under § 2–202 of the Family
28 Law Article;

29 (4) with a mentally incapacitated individual, as defined in § 3–301 of the
30 Criminal Law Article;

31 (5) with a physically helpless individual, as defined in § 3–301 of the

1 Criminal Law Article; or

2 (6) with a substantially cognitively impaired individual, as defined in §
3 3–301 of the Criminal Law Article.

4 11–701.

5 (q) “Tier III sex offender” means a person who has been convicted of:

6 (1) conspiring to commit, attempting to commit, or committing a violation
7 of:

8 (v) the common law offense of sodomy, as that offense existed before
9 October 1, 2020, or § 3–322 of the Criminal Law Article, **AS THAT OFFENSE EXISTED**
10 **BEFORE OCTOBER 1, 2023**, if the offense was committed with force or threat of force; or

11 11–1007.

12 (a) (6) (i) “Sexual abuse” means any act that involves sexual molestation
13 or exploitation of a child whether or not the sexual molestation or exploitation of the child
14 is by a parent or other individual who has permanent or temporary care, custody, or
15 responsibility for supervision of a child, or by any household or family member.

16 (ii) “Sexual abuse” includes[:

17 1.] incest, rape, or sexual offense in any degree[; and

18 2. unnatural or perverted sexual practices].

21 (z) “Sexual molestation or exploitation” includes:

22 (1) allowing or encouraging a child to engage in:

23 (i) obscene photography, films, poses, or similar activity;

27 (3) rape;

1 (4) sexual offense in any degree; and

5 October 1, 2023.
