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## Higher Education - Hunger-Free Campus Grant Program - Alterations

- 3 FOR the purpose of altering the requirement of the Governor, beginning in a certain fiscal year, to include in the annual budget bill a certain appropriation for the 4 5 Hunger-Free Campus Grant Program; altering eligibility requirements for the 6 Program; requiring the Maryland Higher Education Commission to allocate certain 7 grant funding to certain public institutions of higher education or regional higher education centers for certain purposes; authorizing the Commission to maintain a 8 9 certain percentage of each grant to administer the Program; and generally relating 10 to alterations to the Hunger-Free Campus Grant Program.

- 21 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
- 22 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

## Article - Education 1 2 11-1701.3 In this subtitle the following words have the meanings indicated. (a) "Emergency assistance" means immediate direct assistance provided by a 4 (b) hunger-free campus to any student facing an unanticipated financial crisis or hardship. 5 6 (c) "Hunger-free campus" means a campus of any 4-year public institution of 7 higher education or regional higher education center that meets the requirements of § 8 11-1703(a) of this subtitle or any 2-year public institution of higher education that meets 9 the requirements of § 11–1703(b) of this subtitle. "Program" means the Hunger-Free Campus Grant Program. 10 (d) 11 11-1702.12 (a) There is a Hunger-Free Campus Grant Program. 13 (b) The purpose of the Program is to: 14 (1) Address student hunger; 15 (2)Leverage more sustainable solutions to address basic food needs on 16 campus; (3)17 Raise awareness of services currently offered on campus that address 18 basic food needs; and 19 Build strategic partnerships at the local, State, and national levels to 20 address food insecurity among students. 21 The Commission shall administer the Program. (c) (1) 22 The Commission shall develop the form to be used for the annual student survey required under § 11–1703 of this subtitle. 2324 11-1703.25 The Commission shall designate as a hunger-free campus any campus of a 26 4-year public institution of higher education or regional higher education center that:

28 (i) Meets at least three times per academic year; and

Has established a hunger task force that:

1	(ii) Sets at least two goals with action plans;
2	(2) Has designated a staff member responsible for:
3 4	(i) Assisting students in enrolling in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program; or
5 6 7	(ii) Connecting students with available Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program outreach partners that can assist students in enrolling in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program;
8 9 10	(3) Has designated a staff member responsible for informing students participating in federal work–study programs that they are eligible for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program;
11 12	(4) (i) Provides options for students to utilize Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits at campus retailers; or
13 14	(ii) Provides students with information on the names and locations of off–campus retailers that accept Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits;
15 16 17	(5) Participates in an awareness day campaign activity and plans at least one campus awareness event during the National Hunger and Homelessness Awareness Week;
18 19	(6) Provides at least one food pantry on campus, or enables students in need to receive food through a separate, stigma—free arrangement;
20 21 22	(7) Develops and maintains a meal—sharing program that allows students to donate their unused meal plan credits to be distributed to students in need for use in campus dining halls or at an on–campus food pantry, if applicable;
23 24	(8) Conducts a standardized annual student survey on hunger and submits the results to the Commission; and
25 26	(9) Submits an annual report detailing its efforts to address student hunger to the Commission.
27 28 29 30 31	(b) The Commission shall designate as a hunger–free campus any campus of a 2–year public institution of higher education that meets all of the requirements for 4–year public institutions of higher education or regional higher education centers identified in subsection (a) of this section, with the exception of the requirements in subsection (a)(4) and (7) of this section.
32 33	(c) (1) Each 4-year public institution of higher education may develop its own procedures for a meal-sharing program.

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

ASSOCIATED WITH PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION.

The 4-year public institutions of higher education shall make 1 (2)2 information about the meal-sharing program publicly available, including: 3 (i) How a student may donate unused meal plan credits; 4 (ii) How a student in need may apply to receive donated meal plan credits; and 5 6 The methodology that a 4-year public institution of higher (iii) 7 education uses to ensure that unused donated meal plan credits are used to purchase food to support an on-campus food pantry, if applicable. 8 9 11 - 1704.10 For fiscal year 2023 and [each fiscal year thereafter] FISCAL YEAR 2024, the Governor shall include in the annual budget bill an appropriation of \$150,000 for the 11 12 Program. 13 (B) FOR FISCAL YEAR 2025 AND EACH FISCAL YEAR THEREAFTER, THE GOVERNOR SHALL INCLUDE IN THE ANNUAL BUDGET BILL AN APPROPRIATION OF 14 \$1,500,000 \$225,000 FOR THE PROGRAM. 15 16 11-1705.17 The Commission shall allocate grant funding to any 4-year or 2-year public institution of higher education or regional higher education center that: 18 19 Pledges a matching contribution to be used to implement the goals of (1) the Program, INCLUDING AT LEAST \$25,000 IN CASH OR IN-KIND CONTRIBUTION: and 20 21 (2)Is designated as a hunger–free campus. 22(b) **(1)** The Commission shall determine the amount of each grant. THE COMMISSION SHALL ALLOCATE TO EACH FIRST-TIME 23 **(2)** 24RECIPIENT AT LEAST \$50,000 \$25,000 AND NOT MORE THAN \$150,000 FOR PROGRAMMATIC AND ORGANIZATION-BUILDING ACTIVITIES THAT: 2526 INCREASE THE CAPACITY OF INSTITUTIONS AND CENTERS 27 TO IMPLEMENT THE PROGRAM; AND

PROVIDE SEED MONEY FOR INDIRECT, UP-FRONT COSTS



SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 2023.
