#### 1 AN ACT concerning

## Criminal Procedure - Incompetency to Stand Trial - Dismissal of Charges and Victims' Rights

## FOR the purpose of altering a certain time period after which a court is required to dismiss a certain charge against a defendant found incompetent to stand trial under certain circumstances; authorizing a victim or victim's representative to petition the court to extend the time for dismissal of certain charges against a defendant found incompetent to stand trial; and generally relating to incompetency to stand trial.

- SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,

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1 State petitions the court for extraordinary cause to extend the time, the court shall dismiss 2 the charge against a defendant found incompetent to stand trial under this subtitle:

# 3 (1) WHEN CHARGED WITH MURDER IN THE FIRST DEGREE IN 4 VIOLATION OF § 2–201 OF THE CRIMINAL LAW ARTICLE OR SEXUALLY ASSAULTIVE 5 BEHAVIOR AS DEFINED IN § 10–923 OF THE COURTS ARTICLE, AFTER THE LESSER 6 OF THE EXPIRATION OF 10 YEARS OR THE MAXIMUM SENTENCE FOR THE MOST 7 SERIOUS OFFENSE CHARGED;

15 (b) Whether or not the defendant is confined, if the court considers that resuming 16 the criminal proceeding would be unjust because so much time has passed since the 17 defendant was found incompetent to stand trial, the court shall dismiss the charge without 18 prejudice. However, the court may not dismiss a charge without providing the State's 19 Attorney and a victim or victim's representative who has requested notification under § 20 3–123(c) of this title advance notice and an opportunity to be heard.

21 (c) If charges are dismissed under this section, the court shall notify:

(1) the victim of the crime charged or the victim's representative who has
 requested notification under § 3–123(c) of this title; and

Whenever a person has been committed to the Maryland Department of Health under § 3–112 of this article for a crime of violence and a victim of the crime or a victim's representative has submitted a written request to the Maryland Department of Health for notification or submitted a notification request form under § 11–104 of this title, the victim or victim's representative has:
