1	WHEREAS, The Holocaust, the state-sponsored, systematic persecution and
2	murder of European Jews by Nazi Germany and its collaborators, resulted in the murder
3	of six million Jewish men and women, including one and a half million children; and

- WHEREAS, Millions of survivors of the Holocaust endured great suffering through violence, torture, slave labor, and brutal medical experimentation; and
- WHEREAS, Millions of others, including Roma, people with disabilities, LGBTQ people, Jehovah's Witnesses, political dissidents, and more suffered and died because of bigotry and hate; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Prejudice, bigotry, bias, and racism have been, and continue to be, the 10 cause of conflict, war, and mass atrocities; and
- WHEREAS, Research shows that the tragedy that is the Holocaust is quickly being forgotten, which will inevitably lead to an increased likelihood of ethnic cleansing, genocide, terrorism, and crimes against humanity; and
- WHEREAS, Social media has proven to be a platform for spreading misinformation, lies, and hate; and
- WHEREAS, Holocaust denial, the effort to minimize the historical reality and barbarism of the Holocaust and the vast extent of death and carnage it caused, is becoming commonplace; and
- WHEREAS, Remembering the Holocaust offers an opportunity to study and reflect on the moral responsibilities of individuals, societies, and governments; and
- WHEREAS, It is important to remember, honor, and emulate the righteous people, including the Allied Forces, who risked their lives to save thousands of innocent people during the Holocaust and to learn from their legacy of courage, selflessness, and hope; and
- WHEREAS, January 27th is the date designated by the United Nations as International Holocaust Remembrance Day; and
- WHEREAS, The State of Israel, a democratic ally of the United States, has been a safe haven for Jews fleeing the horrors of the Holocaust and persecution; now, therefore,
- SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That Section(s) 7–402 through 7–418 of Article – General Provisions of the Annotated Code of Maryland be renumbered to be Section(s) 7–403 through 7–419, respectively.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:
