10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)					

Allegany College of Maryland was established in 1961 to provide low-cost, high quality, higher education for the residents of the area. 11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

Allegany College of Maryland is pleased to make its athletic facilities available to the community. The condition of the courts has deteriorated over time due to heavy usage by community members and by the girls and boys tennis teams from local high schools, who use ACM courts as their home for matches and practices. Due to drainage issues and complications created by reasons outside of the control of the College, the courts have become overgrown with weeds and have large puddles where rainwater collects. This issue has been elevated by a lack of proper drainage, underwater springs, and foundational issues from the courts that were originally laid down in the 1970s. These pose major safety and usage issues, as the courts are heavily used by community members and have been scheduled to be used by the local high school league for tournaments and matches. This request is to resurrect the community tennis courts at ACM to make it a quality facility for all to utilize.

28. Comments

Tennis is a sport with a very low barrier to participate. Our courts are free to use and equipment is easy and affordable to obtain. The tennis courts at Allegany College of Maryland were built over 40 years ago to serve our community. The condition of the courts has deteriorated and safety has become an issue. As documented on the available photos, large cracks are commonplace throughout the courts, making play nearly impossible.

The Colleges site offers numerous advantages over any other location for a community facility. With an experienced, professional Athletics staff accustomed to managing multiple schedules and juggling facility usage by campus and community groups, the College will assume responsibility for scheduling the usage of the courts and overall, ongoing management. With a full Physical Plant staff, the College will provide maintenance and grounds care to ensure the courts remain in quality condition consistent with its campus-wide high standards. With a trained and supervised Security staff, the College will play a vital role in promoting and preserving safety for users and spectators. Additionally, the College offers abundant, paved parking adjacent to the soccer field, which can accommodate passenger vehicles as well as vans and buses. The Colleges central, convenient location inside Cumberland boundaries and near Interstate 68 (also on a public transit route) makes it a particularly appealing addition to the local community and the adjacent UPMC Medical Center.

Without the funding these necessary enhancements could not be accomplished, which only creates further despair for the community members who deeply value the sport of tennis and the means of recreation for them and their children.

According to the Participation in Local Park and Recreation Activities in Maryland survey, the participation rate for tennis exceeds football, soccer, baseball, and softball. The US Sports, Fitness, and Recreation Participation Report from the Physical Activity Council (PAC) states that despite fluctuating participation trends among traditional sports, tennis continues to lead the pack in long-term participation growth. The study shows tennis as one of only two sports with positive participation growth during the previous 12 years. The fact that tennis is one of only two traditional sports in the U.S. with positive growth over the past 12 years is a testament to tennis not only being a 'sport of a lifetime,' but also to the concerted and collaborative efforts across this industry to grow the sport, says TIA Executive Director Jolyn de Boer.
