10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)

The Liberty Grace Church of God has a 501c3 community outreach organization called the Grace Foundation. The mission of the Grace Foundation is to promote literacy and the elimination of health disparities among vulnerable populations through trusted sources. We led the COVID vaccine effort for faith-based organizations in Baltimore. We serve a more than 90% Black community and suffer disproportionately from numerous health disparities, including the high incidence of chronic diseases such as diabetes, obesity, and heart disease. To improve population health in west Baltimore, the Liberty Grace Church and Johns Hopkins have established the Interfaith Family Health Center (IFHC) of Baltimore, delivering healthcare services directly to the community. The IFHC builds on the church's trust and Johns Hopkins's clinical expertise.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

Goal:Use the IFHC and Liberty Grace's Food Ministry and renovate the kitchen to promote community members' knowledge and understanding ofhealthy foodpreparation. a.Objectives: i. Register individuals to receive food through LifeBridge Health and other food distributions at Liberty Grace. ii. Offer bi-monthly healthy soul food cooking for family and holidaysintheLiberty Grace commercial kitchen. A redesigned kitchen with renovated restrooms will allow us to engage and educate at least 500 community members annually. Transparent walls, a modernized audible process, and an instructional-designed kitchen will address one of the primary needs of the community. Healthy, inexpensive, tasty food is the desire of the population we serve. We willregularly collect quantitative and qualitative feedback from participants to assess the program's impact. This is all being done in partnership with John Hopkins Hospitals Brancatti Center.

28. Comments

The faith-based community has a special relationship with the broader community, can act as a trusted source of information, and encourage healthy behaviors impeded by social determinants of health. In the Church, the individual becomes part of a larger group working toward healthier living. As a result, group participants become more receptive to learning and implementing new information that might challenge their current way of life. The church community does not define members by their diseases, behaviors, or environment. Thus, in this nonjudgmental space, community participants can both acknowledge that they have health concerns that need to be addressed and also, with trusted support, take the initial steps toward improving their health. The Church can then build a sense of community and a partnership with the health system. This church-centered instructional model allows participants to achieve better health outcomes and contribute to reducing overall healthcare costs by focusing on preventive care and early interventions. Our overarching goal is to improve the community's health by capitalizing on the existing trust with the Church and partnering to bring health education and preventive health programs to the community in their place of worship. This approach serves to overcome barriers, including lack of trust and agency to seek care, improving access to high-quality healthcare, and improving health.

The funds we have received address program costs, but the current bond request is for capital costs only.

The development of this teaching kitchen is vitally crucial since chronic disease and minimal health literacy play a significant role in the overall health of the 21215 community. In some of our surrounding communities, households earn less than \$25,000. These lower-income households are more likely to be uninsured, have unmet medical needs, and have low health literacy. Chronic diseases have taken over acute diseases as the leading causes of mortality and illness in the U.S. and Baltimore City. Many individuals suffer from two or more chronic conditions, and healthy food preparation will serve them well.

COVID-19 has exacerbated the health disparities in the U.S. and much of Baltimore City due to longstanding health inequities.

The complexities of managing social determinants of health, including healthy food access, preparation, and other challenges. In partnership with existing healthcare institutions, a church-based teaching kitchen can become a model for our city and state.
