Minary's Dream Alliance (MDA) mission is to improve the lives of families and youth on the Eastern Shore of Maryland, particularly those families that are disadvantaged and underserved by existing institutions and organizations and to promote equity, community and improved educational and homelife outcomes. Minary's Dream Alliance provides opportunities for mentoring, tutoring, vocational training, college, and career readiness.

## **11. Description and Purpose of Project** (Limit length to visible area)

The facility that Minary's Dream Alliance purchased in 2021 was built in the 1950s and has not been updated to ADA standards. The building is situated on a nine (9)-acre parcel with direct water access to the Chester River. The 5,613 sq. ft. building consists of a ballroom that can accommodate up to 300 people, an elevated stage, individual offices, conference rooms, and a commercial-grade kitchen. Outbuildings can transform into programmatic opportunities for youth, a picnic area, and a dock. The renovations will include adding a ramp for wheelchairs, replacing all the doors, windows, and a handicapped stair lift. Other renovations include three bathrooms to ensure they are ADA compliant and work properly.

## 28. Comments

The anticipated renovations to our property will eliminate barriers to all persons being able to utilize the space in a safe and inclusive manner. Minary's Dream Alliance operates the following programs that have limitations to the number of people we can serve without further renovations of the space.

\*Feed the Elderly: In its third year of operation, MDA continues weekly deliveries of fresh produce, protein and staples to more than 200 elderly households in Kent County.

\*Club FEAR (Face Everything and Rise): A model for prevention of substance abuse, MDA partners across the Mid-Shore with local schools, families, truancy courts, and other local health resources. The children referred to Club FEAR are included in afterschool. activities like fishing, kayaking, gardening, cooking, or podcast production. The program also focuses on providing lessons on life skills in finance, leadership, and community. advocacy. For those who require more personalized support, there are mentors the club. can assign for individual adolescents. If a club member needs treatment for substance abuse disorders, Club FEAR connects the family with treatment providers in the community

\*ComUnity Mentoring Program: This program is for students in grades 7-12 at risk of disconnection from school and community life, as well as youth ages 16-24 who are not. working. Services include mentorship (1:1 and Group Mentoring), workshops (College & Career Info, Life Skills, Mental Health Awareness, Artistic Expression), cultural & recreational field trips, and homework help with food provided on-site.

\*Hip Hop Time Capsule: A partnership with Washington Colleges Chesapeake Heartland, a collaboration with the Smithsonians National Museum of African American History and Culture. Over the course of four weeks, students interview community elders, listen. to decades-old bootleg recordings, pore through centuries-old documents, write poems, mix tracks, design album covers, and develop their own musical personas. The students produce their own beats and musical compilations, created cover art reinterpreting. historic images, and crafted lyrics and poems highlighting Black heroes in our region's. past.
