2 **Criminal Law – Sexual Extortion, Stalking, and Revenge Porn – Statute of**
3 **Limitations and In Banc Review**

4 FOR the purpose of altering the statute of limitations applicable to the crimes of sexual
5 extortion and stalking; providing that the State may institute a prosecution for
6 ~~sexual extortion, stalking, or~~ revenge porn at any time; providing that, for purposes
7 of the Maryland Constitution, a person who commits ~~sexual extortion, stalking, or~~
8 revenge porn shall be deemed to have committed a misdemeanor whose punishment
9 is confinement in the penitentiary and may reserve a point or question for a certain
10 in banc review; and generally relating to sexual extortion, stalking, and revenge
11 porn.

6 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
 7 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

8 **Article – Courts and Judicial Proceedings**

9 5–106.

10 (a) Except as provided by this section, § 1–303 of the Environment Article, and §
 11 8–1815 of the Natural Resources Article, a prosecution for a misdemeanor shall be
 12 instituted within 1 year after the offense was committed.

13 (b) Notwithstanding § 9–103(a)(3) of the Correctional Services Article or any
 14 other provision of the Code, if a statute provides that a misdemeanor is punishable by
 15 imprisonment in the penitentiary or that a person is subject to this subsection:

16 (1) The State may institute a prosecution for the misdemeanor at any time;
 17 and

18 (2) For purposes of the Maryland Constitution, the person:

19 (i) Shall be deemed to have committed a misdemeanor whose
 20 punishment is confinement in the penitentiary; and

21 (ii) May reserve a point or question for in banc review as provided
 22 under Article IV, § 22 of the Maryland Constitution.

22 (2) “Distribute” means to give, sell, transfer, disseminate, publish, upload,
23 circulate, broadcast, make available, allow access to, or engage in any other form of
24 transmission, electronic or otherwise.

25 (3) “Harm” means:

26 (i) physical injury;

27 (ii) serious emotional distress; or

28 (iii) economic damages.

1 (4) “Intimate parts” means the naked genitals, pubic area, buttocks, or
2 female nipple.

3 (5) “Sexual activity” means:

4 (i) sexual intercourse, including genital–genital, oral–genital,
5 anal–genital, or oral–anal;

6 (ii) masturbation; or

7 (iii) sadomasochistic abuse.

8 (b) (1) This section does not apply to:

9 (i) lawful and common practices of law enforcement, the reporting
10 of unlawful conduct, or legal proceedings; or

11 (ii) situations involving voluntary exposure in public or commercial
12 settings.

13 (2) An interactive computer service, as defined in 47 U.S.C. § 230(f)(2), is
14 not liable under this section for content provided by another person.

15 (c) A person may not knowingly distribute a visual representation of another
16 identifiable person that displays the other person with his or her intimate parts exposed or
17 while engaged in an act of sexual activity:

18 (1) with the intent to harm, harass, intimidate, threaten, or coerce the
19 other person;

20 (2) (i) under circumstances in which the person knew that the other
21 person did not consent to the distribution; or

22 (ii) with reckless disregard as to whether the person consented to the
23 distribution; and

24 (3) under circumstances in which the other person had a reasonable
25 expectation that the image would remain private.

26 (d) A person who violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction
27 is subject to imprisonment not exceeding 2 years or a fine not exceeding \$5,000 or both.

30 (F) A visual representation of a victim that is part of a court record for a case
31 arising from a prosecution under this section:

5 (i) court personnel;

9 (v) a law enforcement officer;

10 (vi) the defendant or the defendant’s attorney; or

11 (vii) the victim or the victim’s attorney.
