A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

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County Boards of Education – Budgets – Notice (Transparency in Education Spending Act)

- 4 FOR the purpose of requiring the State Board of Education to adopt a process for the $\mathbf{5}$ uniform and timely reporting of certain county board of education budget 6 information to a county governing body; requiring a county board to post certain 7 information in a certain manner on the county board's website; requiring a certain 8 transfer to be made only following the approval of the county commissioners or the 9 county council; providing for exemptions from certain requirements related to certain transfers; requiring a certain audit to be sent to the county council or the 10 11 county commissioners; and generally relating to the budgets of county boards of 12education.

- 23 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
- 24 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

1 (a) (1) Subject to the rules and regulations of the State Board and with the 2 advice of the county superintendent, each county board shall prepare an annual budget 3 according to:

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(i) The major categories listed in this section; and

(ii) Any other major category required by the State Board.

6 (2) In addition to the information required by this section, the county fiscal 7 authorities may require the county board to provide details to the service areas and 8 activities levels in the account structure within the "Financial Reporting Manual for 9 Maryland Public Schools".

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(3) With the annual budget, each county board shall provide:

11 (i) The number of full-time equivalent positions included within 12 each major category; and

(ii) A description of any fund balances or other money held by any
 outside source, including an insurer, that are undesignated or unreserved and are under
 the direction and control of the county board.

16 (4) THE STATE BOARD SHALL ADOPT A PROCESS FOR THE UNIFORM 17 REPORTING OF THE INFORMATION IN SUBSECTION (B) OF THIS SECTION TO TIMELY 18 SHARE THE INFORMATION PROVIDED BY A COUNTY BOARD IN SUBSECTION (B) OF 19 THIS SECTION TO A COUNTY GOVERNING BODY.

17 18	(a) In this subtitle, "county council" means, in Baltimore City, the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore.				
19 20	(b) (1) Each county board shall submit an annual school budget in writing to the county commissioners, county council, or county executive.				
21 22 23	(2) The budget shall be submitted not less than 45 days before the date for levying local taxes or on an earlier date on or after March 1 as may be requested by the county fiscal authority.				

24 (e) (1) Copies of the budget shall be made available to the public, on request, 25 at the time it is submitted by the county board.

council shall be sent to the State Superintendent within 30 days after approval AND

5 (a) All revenues received by a county board shall be spent by the board in 6 accordance with the major categories of its annual budget as provided under § 5–101 of this 7 subtitle.

8 (b) (1) (i) A transfer may be made within the major categories without 9 recourse to the county commissioners or county council except that a report of the transfer 10 shall be submitted to the county commissioners or county council within 15 days after the 11 end of each month.

12 (ii) A report under subparagraph (i) of this paragraph shall include 13 a narrative summary that clearly indicates each transfer.

14 (2) (I) [A] EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBPARAGRAPH (II) OF THIS 15 PARAGRAPH, A transfer between major categories OF MORE THAN 1% OF THE TOTAL 16 FUNDING IN A MAJOR CATEGORY shall be made only [with] FOLLOWING the approval of 17 the county commissioners or county council.

18 (II) 1. A COUNTY BOARD MAY MAKE A TRANSFER BETWEEN 19 MAJOR CATEGORIES OF MORE THAN 1% OF THE TOTAL FUNDING IN A MAJOR 20 CATEGORY WITHOUT THE APPROVAL OF THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OR COUNTY 21 COUNCIL IF THE TIMING IN ACHIEVING APPROVAL OF THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS 22 OR COUNTY COUNCIL WOULD RESULT IN THE LOSS OF OPPORTUNITY.

IF A TRANSFER IS MADE UNDER SUBSUBPARAGRAPH 24 1 OF THIS SUBPARAGRAPH, A COUNTY BOARD SHALL REPORT THE TRANSFER 25 BETWEEN MAJOR CATEGORIES OF MORE THAN 1% OF THE TOTAL FUNDING IN A 26 MAJOR CATEGORY EXPEDITIOUSLY TO THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OR COUNTY 27 COUNCIL WITH AN EXPLANATION OF THE CIRCUMSTANCES NECESSITATING THE 28 EXPEDITED REALLOCATION.

(3) If the county commissioners or county council fail to take action on a
 request for transfer between major categories within 30 days after the receipt of a written
 request substantiating the transfer, the failure to take action constitutes approval.

32 (4) A county board shall submit to the county governing body a report 33 within 15 days after the end of each month if during that month the county board takes 34 any action that would commit the county board to spend more for the current fiscal year in 35 any major category than the amount approved in the annual budget for that category.

1 (5) A report under paragraph (4) of this subsection shall include a narrative 2 explanation of the action taken, indicating any request for transfer between categories that 3 may become necessary for the fiscal year as a result of the action.

5 (a) (1) Each county board shall provide for an annual audit of its financial 6 transactions and accounts.

7 (2) At the request of the Department, a county board shall conduct an audit 8 under § 5–203 of this title.

9 (b) (1) The audit shall be made by a certified public accountant or a 10 partnership of certified public accountants who are:

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- (i) Licensed by the State Board of Public Accountancy; and
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(ii) Approved by the State Superintendent.

13 (2) The audit shall be made in accordance with the standards and 14 regulations adopted by the State Board.

15 (c) (1) The results of the audit, including the letter of recommendation 16 submitted by the auditor, are a matter of public record.

17 (2) The results shall be reported within 3 months after the close of the fiscal 18 year for the county board on the form and in the manner required by the State Board to:

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(i) The State Superintendent;

20 (ii) The county fiscal authority AND THE COUNTY COUNCIL OR 21 THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS;

(iii) The Joint Audit and Evaluation Committee of the GeneralAssembly;

 30 county council may conduct an audit using auditors employed by the county.

2 (a) (1) Each county board shall make the reports required by the State Board 3 and by the State Superintendent.

4 (2) The reports shall be made at the time, include the items, and be on the 5 forms required by the State Board and by the State Superintendent.

6 (b) (1) Each county board shall prepare, publish, and make available to 7 interested parties an annual report on the condition, current accomplishments, and needs 8 for improvement of the schools as well as a statement of the business and financial 9 transactions of the county board.

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- (2) This report shall be published before the end of the calendar year.

11 (c) The public schools of each county shall use a uniform method, as required by 12 the county superintendent, for reporting the receipts, expenditures, and balances of the 13 operations and activities conducted by the public schools.

(d) (1) At the request of the county governing body made in writing at least 30 days before the reporting deadline, the county board or superintendent shall report to the county governing body on or before November 1 and March 1 of each fiscal year on the school system's operations, including any adjustment made to the approved annual budget AND POST THE REPORT ON THE COUNTY BOARD'S PUBLIC-FACING WEBSITE, IN AN EASILY IDENTIFIABLE LOCATION.

20 (2) A report under this subsection shall be made available to all interested 21 persons.

(e) (1) At the request of the county board made in writing at least 30 days
before the reporting deadline the county governing body shall report to the county board on
or before November 1 and March 1 of each fiscal year on the county's fiscal status for the
immediate fiscal year and the subsequent fiscal year AND POST THE REPORT ON THE
COUNTY BOARD'S PUBLIC-FACING WEBSITE, IN AN EASILY IDENTIFIABLE LOCATION.

27 (2) A report under this subsection shall be made available to all interested28 persons.

SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July
 1, 2024.
