A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Public Safety – 9–1–1 Trust Fund – Alterations**

3 FOR the purpose of altering the 9–1–1 Trust Fund to authorize the use of certain allocated
4 funds for the payment of the salary of certain personnel; and generally relating to
5 the 9–1–1 Trust Fund.

6 BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments,
7 Article – Public Safety
8 Section 1–308 and 1–309
9 Annotated Code of Maryland
10 (2022 Replacement Volume and 2023 Supplement)

11 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
12 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

13 **Article – Public Safety**

14 1–308.

15 (a) There is a 9–1–1 Trust Fund.

16 (b) (1) Except as provided in paragraph (2) of this subsection and subject to §
17 1–309.1 of this subtitle, the purposes of the 9–1–1 Trust Fund are to:

18 (i) reimburse counties for the cost of enhancing a 9–1–1 system;

19 (ii) pay contractors in accordance with § 1–306(b)(12) of this subtitle;

20 and

1 (iii) fund the coordinator position and staff to handle the increased
2 duties related to wireless enhanced 9-1-1 service under § 1-305 of this subtitle, as an
3 administrative cost.

4 (2) Subject to paragraph (3) of this subsection, in addition to the purposes
5 described under paragraph (1) of this subsection, the purposes of the 9-1-1 Trust Fund
6 include funding:

7 (i) the operation and maintenance of 9-1-1 systems, enhanced
8 9-1-1 systems, and Next Generation 9-1-1 services, including:

9 1. equipment and software utilized directly for providing
10 9-1-1 services by a public safety answering point;

11 2. protocol systems and software utilized directly for
12 providing 9-1-1 services by a public safety answering point;

13 3. interpretation services provided for a public safety
14 answering point;

15 4. services provided for a public safety answering point to
16 ensure improved access to individuals with disabilities and other individuals who use
17 assistive technology; and

18 5. voice, data, and call log recorders utilized to capture
19 information from 9-1-1 systems, enhanced 9-1-1 systems, and Next Generation 9-1-1
20 services;

21 (ii) the operation and maintenance of 9-1-1 systems, enhanced
22 9-1-1 systems, and Next Generation 9-1-1 services connectivity and infrastructure
23 equipment, including:

24 1. automatic number and location identification; and

25 2. Primary Rate Interface and Session Initiation Protocol
26 trunking for 10-digit emergency and nonemergency lines;

27 (iii) geographical information systems hardware, software, data
28 development, and data management costs incurred for the effective operation of 9-1-1
29 systems, enhanced 9-1-1 systems, and Next Generation 9-1-1 services, including:

30 1. mapping equipment;

31 2. interfaces to computer-aided dispatch; and

32 3. geographical information systems base layer development
33 and management;

1 (iv) public safety answering point facilities costs, including access
2 control, security systems, and standby power;

3 (v) costs for public education materials;

4 (vi) the training of county personnel working in or directly
5 supporting a public safety answering point;

6 (vii) the provision of tuition reimbursement for 9-1-1 specialists for
7 educational programs related to the 9-1-1 specialist career field;

8 (viii) costs to maintain the cybersecurity of 9-1-1 systems, enhanced
9 9-1-1 systems, and Next Generation 9-1-1 services; and

10 (ix) costs of 9-1-1 specialist recruitment activities as described in §
11 1-306(b)(17) of this subtitle.

12 (3) Funding allocated in accordance with paragraph (2) of this subsection
13 may not be utilized for[:

14 (i) the payment of the salary of public safety answering point
15 personnel or county personnel; or

16 (ii)] any purpose associated with the 9-8-8 suicide prevention
17 hotline.

18 (c) The 9-1-1 Trust Fund consists of:

19 (1) money from the 9-1-1 fee collected and remitted to the Comptroller
20 under § 1-310 of this subtitle;

21 (2) money from the additional charge collected and remitted to the
22 Comptroller under § 1-311 of this subtitle;

23 (3) money from the prepaid wireless E 9-1-1 fee collected and remitted to
24 the Comptroller under § 1-313 of this subtitle; and

25 (4) investment earnings of the 9-1-1 Trust Fund.

26 (d) Money in the 9-1-1 Trust Fund shall be held in the State Treasury.

27 (e) The Secretary shall administer the 9-1-1 Trust Fund, subject to the
28 guidelines for financial management and budgeting established by the Department of
29 Budget and Management.

30 (f) The Secretary shall direct the Comptroller to establish separate accounts in

1 the 9-1-1 Trust Fund for the payment of administrative expenses and for each county.

2 (g) (1) Any investment earnings shall be credited to the 9-1-1 Trust Fund.

3 (2) The Comptroller shall allocate the investment income among the
4 accounts in the 9-1-1 Trust Fund, prorated on the basis of the total fees collected in each
5 county.

6 1-309.

7 (a) On recommendation of the Board, each year the Secretary shall request an
8 appropriation from the 9-1-1 Trust Fund in an amount sufficient to:

9 (1) carry out the purposes of this subtitle;

10 (2) pay the administrative costs chargeable to the 9-1-1 Trust Fund; and

11 (3) reimburse counties for the cost of enhancing a 9-1-1 system.

12 (b) (1) Subject to the limitations under subsection (e) of this section, the
13 Comptroller shall disburse the money in the 9-1-1 Trust Fund as provided in this
14 subsection.

15 (2) Each July 1, the Comptroller shall allocate sufficient money from the
16 State 9-1-1 fee to pay the costs of administering the 9-1-1 Trust Fund.

17 (3) As directed by the Secretary and in accordance with the State budget,
18 the Comptroller, from the appropriate account, shall:

19 (i) reimburse counties for the cost of enhancing a 9-1-1 system;

20 (ii) pay contractors in accordance with § 1-306(b)(12) of this subtitle;

21 and

22 (iii) pay the costs associated with maintenance, operations, and
23 programs approved by the Board in accordance with § 1-308(b) of this subtitle.

24 (4) (i) The Comptroller shall pay to each county from its account the
25 money requested by the county to pay the maintenance and operation costs of the county's
26 9-1-1 system in accordance with the State budget.

27 (ii) The Comptroller shall pay the money for maintenance and
28 operation costs on September 30, December 31, March 31, and June 30 of each year.

29 (c) (1) Money accruing to the 9-1-1 Trust Fund may be used as provided in
30 this subsection.

- 1 (2) Money collected from the State 9-1-1 fee may be used only to:
- 2 (i) pay the administrative costs chargeable to the 9-1-1 Trust Fund;
- 3 (ii) reimburse counties for the cost of enhancing a 9-1-1 system;
- 4 (iii) pay contractors in accordance with § 1-306(b)(12) of this subtitle;
- 5 and
- 6 (iv) pay the costs associated with maintenance, operations, and
- 7 programs approved by the Board in accordance with § 1-308(b) of this subtitle.

8 (3) **MONEY COLLECTED FROM THE STATE 9-1-1 FEE MAY NOT BE**

9 **UTILIZED FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE SALARY OF PUBLIC SAFETY ANSWERING POINT**

10 **PERSONNEL OR COUNTY PERSONNEL.**

11 (4) Money collected from the county 9-1-1 fee may be used by the counties

12 only for the maintenance and operation costs of the 9-1-1 system.

13 [(4)] (5) Money collected from the prepaid wireless E 9-1-1 fee shall be

14 used as follows:

- 15 (i) 25% for the same purpose as the 9-1-1 fee under paragraph (2)
- 16 of this subsection; and
- 17 (ii) 75% for the same purpose as the county 9-1-1 fee under
- 18 paragraph [(3)] (4) of this subsection, prorated on the basis of the total fees collected in
- 19 each county.

20 [(5)] (6) Money accruing to the 9-1-1 Trust Fund may not be used for:

- 21 (i) the maintenance or operation of communications centers other
- 22 than public safety answering points; or
- 23 (ii) any purpose associated with the 9-8-8 suicide prevention
- 24 hotline.

25 (d) (1) Reimbursement may be made only to the extent that county money was

26 used to enhance the 9-1-1 system.

27 (2) Reimbursement for the enhancement of 9-1-1 systems shall include

28 the installation of equipment for automatic number identification, automatic location

29 identification, and other technological advancements that the Board requires.

30 (3) Reimbursement from money collected from the State 9-1-1 fee may be

31 used only for 9-1-1 system enhancements approved by the Board.

1 (e) (1) The Board may direct the Comptroller to withhold from a county money
2 for 9–1–1 system expenditures if the county violates this subtitle or a regulation of the
3 Board.

4 (2) (i) The Board shall state publicly in writing its reason for
5 withholding money from a county and shall record its reason in the minutes of the Board.

6 (ii) On reaching its decision to withhold money, the Board shall
7 notify the county.

8 (iii) The county has 30 days after the date of notification to respond
9 in writing to the Board.

10 (3) (i) On notification by the Board, the Comptroller shall hold money
11 for the county in the county's account in the 9–1–1 Trust Fund.

12 (ii) Money held by the Comptroller under subparagraph (i) of this
13 paragraph does not accrue interest for the county.

14 (iii) Interest income earned on money held by the Comptroller under
15 subparagraph (i) of this paragraph accrues to the 9–1–1 Trust Fund.

16 (4) County money withheld by the Comptroller shall be withheld until the
17 Board directs the Comptroller to release the money.

18 (f) (1) The Legislative Auditor may conduct fiscal/compliance audits of the
19 9–1–1 Trust Fund and of the appropriations and disbursements made for purposes of this
20 subtitle.

21 (2) The cost of the fiscal portion of the audits shall be paid from the 9–1–1
22 Trust Fund as an administrative cost.

23 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act is an emergency
24 measure, is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health or safety, has
25 been passed by a yea and nay vote supported by three–fifths of all the members elected to
26 each of the two Houses of the General Assembly, and shall take effect from the date it is
27 enacted.
