1 AN ACT concerning

2 Election Law – Polling Place Procedures – Individual Assisting a Voter

FOR the purpose of prohibiting an individual assisting a voter in marking or preparing the
ballot at a polling place from assisting more than a certain number of unrelated
voters during an election, <u>unless the individual is an election judge</u>, or from receiving
compensation for assisting a voter in marking or preparing the ballot; and generally
relating to voter assistance at polling places.

13 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 14 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

17 (c) (1) Before a voter enters a voting booth, at the request of the voter, an 18 election judge shall:

(i) instruct the voter about the operation of the voting system; and

1 (7) Except as provided in paragraph (3) or (4) of this subsection, an 2 individual over the age of 17 years may not accompany a voter into a voting booth.
