A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Fair Share for Maryland Act of 2024**

3 FOR the purpose of altering a certain limit on the unified credit used for determining the
4 Maryland estate tax for decedents dying on or after a certain date; altering a certain
5 limitation on the amount of the Maryland estate tax for decedents dying on or after
6 a certain date; requiring that certain sales of tangible personal property be included
7 in the numerator of the sales factor used for apportioning a corporation's income to
8 the State under certain circumstances; altering the State income tax rate on
9 Maryland taxable income of certain individuals; providing for an additional State
10 individual income tax rate on the net capital gains of individuals, subject to certain
11 exceptions; imposing a certain income tax on income distributed to certain members
12 of certain pass-through entities from the pass-through entity's taxable income
13 exceeding a certain amount; expanding eligibility for the Maryland earned income
14 tax credit for individuals without qualifying children by altering the income
15 thresholds at which the credit phases out; providing that, after a certain taxable
16 year, the income threshold and phase-out amounts are adjusted annually for
17 inflation; altering the definition of "qualified child" and income eligibility
18 requirements for purposes of qualifying for a certain credit against the State income
19 tax for certain dependent children; altering the calculation of the child tax credit;
20 requiring certain corporations to compute Maryland taxable income using a certain
21 method; requiring, subject to regulations adopted by the Comptroller, certain groups
22 of corporations to file a combined income tax return reflecting the aggregate income
23 tax liability of all the members of the group; requiring the Comptroller to adopt
24 certain regulations consistent with certain regulations adopted by the Multistate
25 Tax Commission; requiring the Comptroller to assess interest and penalties under
26 certain circumstances; and generally relating to Maryland estate tax and income tax.

12 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
13 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

14 **Article – Tax – General**

15 7–309.

16 (a) Notwithstanding an Act of Congress that repeals or reduces the federal credit
17 under § 2011 of the Internal Revenue Code, the provisions of this subtitle in effect before
18 the passage of the Act of Congress shall apply with respect to a decedent who dies after the
19 effective date of the Act of Congress so as to continue the Maryland estate tax in force
20 without reduction in the same manner as if the federal credit had not been repealed or
21 reduced.

22 (b) (1) Except as provided in paragraphs (2) through (9) of this subsection and
23 subsection (c) of this section, after the effective date of an Act of Congress described in
24 subsection (a) of this section, the Maryland estate tax shall be determined using:

25 (i) the federal credit allowable by § 2011 of the Internal Revenue
26 Code as in effect before the reduction or repeal of the federal credit pursuant to the Act of
27 Congress; and

28 (ii) other provisions of federal estate tax law as in effect on the date
29 of the decedent’s death.

30 (2) Except as provided in paragraphs (3) through (9) of this subsection and
31 subsection (c) of this section, if the federal estate tax is not in effect on the date of the
32 decedent’s death, the Maryland estate tax shall be determined using:

33 (i) the federal credit allowable by § 2011 of the Internal Revenue
34 Code as in effect before the reduction or repeal of the federal credit pursuant to the Act of
35 Congress; and

1 (ii) other provisions of federal estate tax law as in effect on the date
2 immediately preceding the effective date of the repeal of the federal estate tax.

3 (3) (i) Notwithstanding any increase in the unified credit allowed
4 against the federal estate tax for decedents dying after 2003, the unified credit used for
5 determining the Maryland estate tax for a decedent may not exceed the applicable credit
6 amount corresponding to an applicable exclusion amount, within the meaning of § 2010(c)
7 of the Internal Revenue Code, of:

8 1. \$1,000,000 for a decedent dying before January 1, 2015;

9 2. \$1,500,000 for a decedent dying on or after January 1,
10 2015, but before January 1, 2016;

11 3. \$2,000,000 for a decedent dying on or after January 1,
12 2016, but before January 1, 2017;

13 4. \$3,000,000 for a decedent dying on or after January 1,
14 2017, but before January 1, 2018;

15 5. \$4,000,000 for a decedent dying on or after January 1,
16 2018, but before January 1, 2019; [and]

17 6. \$5,000,000 for a decedent dying on or after January 1,
18 2019, **BUT BEFORE JANUARY 1, 2025**, plus any deceased spousal unused exclusion
19 amount calculated in accordance with paragraph (9) of this subsection; **AND**

20 **7. \$2,000,000 FOR A DECEDENT DYING ON OR AFTER**
21 **JANUARY 1, 2025, PLUS ANY DECEASED SPOUSAL UNUSED EXCLUSION AMOUNT**
22 **CALCULATED IN ACCORDANCE WITH PARAGRAPH (9) OF THIS SUBSECTION.**

23 (ii) The Maryland estate tax shall be determined without regard to
24 any deduction for State death taxes allowed under § 2058 of the Internal Revenue Code.

25 (iii) Unless the federal credit allowable by § 2011 of the Internal
26 Revenue Code is in effect on the date of the decedent's death, the federal credit used to
27 determine the Maryland estate tax may not exceed 16% of the amount by which the
28 decedent's taxable estate, as defined in § 2051 of the Internal Revenue Code, exceeds:

29 1. \$1,000,000 for a decedent dying before January 1, 2015;

30 2. \$1,500,000 for a decedent dying on or after January 1,
31 2015, but before January 1, 2016;

32 3. \$2,000,000 for a decedent dying on or after January 1,
33 2016, but before January 1, 2017;

1 4. \$3,000,000 for a decedent dying on or after January 1,
2 2017, but before January 1, 2018;

3 5. \$4,000,000 for a decedent dying on or after January 1,
4 2018, but before January 1, 2019; [and]

5 6. \$5,000,000 for a decedent dying on or after January 1,
6 2019, **BUT BEFORE JANUARY 1, 2025**, plus any deceased spousal unused exclusion
7 amount calculated in accordance with paragraph (9) of this subsection; **AND**

8 **7. \$2,000,000 FOR A DECEDENT DYING ON OR AFTER**
9 **JANUARY 1, 2025, PLUS ANY DECEASED SPOUSAL UNUSED EXCLUSION AMOUNT**
10 **CALCULATED IN ACCORDANCE WITH PARAGRAPH (9) OF THIS SUBSECTION.**

11 (9) (i) In this paragraph, “deceased spousal unused exclusion amount”
12 means the applicable exclusion amount in effect at the time of the death of the last
13 predeceased spouse of the decedent under paragraph (3) of this subsection reduced by the
14 taxable estate of the last predeceased spouse:

15 1. as reported on a Maryland estate tax return filed with the
16 Comptroller; or

17 2. as reported on a federal estate tax return, if:

18 A. the last predeceased spouse was not a Maryland resident
19 and no property with a Maryland estate tax situs was includible in the gross estate of the
20 last predeceased spouse; or

21 B. the last predeceased spouse died before January 1, 2019,
22 and no Maryland estate tax return was required to be filed with respect to the predeceased
23 spouse’s estate.

24 (ii) The deceased spousal unused exclusion amount may not be taken
25 into account under paragraph (3) of this subsection unless:

26 1. if the last predeceased spouse died on or after January 1,
27 2019, a Maryland estate tax return is timely filed for the last predeceased spouse, on which
28 the deceased spousal unused exclusion amount is calculated and an irrevocable election is
29 made that the deceased spousal unused exclusion amount may be taken into account; or

30 2. if the last predeceased spouse died before January 1, 2019,
31 or was not a Maryland resident and no property with a Maryland estate tax situs was
32 includible in the gross estate of the last predeceased spouse, an election was made under §
33 2010(c) of the Internal Revenue Code on the federal estate tax return of the last
34 predeceased spouse.

1 (iii) 1. Notwithstanding any other provision of this article, the
2 Comptroller may examine a Maryland estate tax return of a predeceased spouse after the
3 time for assessing a tax under this title has expired under § 13–1101 of this article solely
4 for the purposes of determining the validity of the deceased spousal unused exclusion
5 election and the amount to be taken into account under paragraph (3) of this subsection.

6 2. This subparagraph may not be construed to authorize the
7 assessment of any additional tax with respect to the predeceased spouse’s Maryland estate
8 tax return if the period of limitation under § 13–1101 of this article has expired.

10 (d) (1) (i) In this paragraph:

11 1. “manufacturing corporation” means a domestic or foreign
12 corporation which is primarily engaged in activities that, in accordance with the North
13 American Industrial Classification System (NAICS), United States Manual, United States
14 Office of Management and Budget, 1997 Edition, would be included in Sector 11, 31, 32, or
15 33; and

16 2. “manufacturing corporation” does not include a refiner, as
17 defined in § 10–101 of the Business Regulation Article.

18 (ii) If a manufacturing corporation carries on its trade or business
19 within and outside the State and the trade or business is a unitary business, the part of the
20 corporation’s Maryland modified income derived from or reasonably attributable to trade
21 or business carried on in the State shall be determined using a single sales factor
22 apportionment formula, by multiplying its Maryland modified income by 100% of the sales
23 factor.

24 (iii) In filing its tax return for each year, a manufacturing corporation
25 shall certify that the NAICS Code reported on its Maryland return is consistent with that
26 reported to other government agencies.

27 (iv) If the Comptroller determines that a corporation has submitted
28 information that incorrectly classifies the corporation as a manufacturing corporation
29 under subparagraph (i) of this paragraph, the Comptroller shall reclassify the corporation
30 in an appropriate manner.

31 (2) Except as provided in paragraphs (1) and (3) of this subsection:

32 (i) for a taxable year beginning after December 31, 2017, but before
33 January 1, 2019, if the trade or business is a unitary business, the part of the corporation’s
34 Maryland modified income derived from or reasonably attributable to trade or business
35 carried on in the State shall be determined using a 3–factor apportionment fraction:

1 1. the numerator of which is the sum of the property factor,
2 the payroll factor, and 3 times the sales factor; and

3 2. the denominator of which is 5;

4 (ii) for a taxable year beginning after December 31, 2018, but before
5 January 1, 2020, if the trade or business is a unitary business, the part of the corporation's
6 Maryland modified income derived from or reasonably attributable to trade or business
7 carried on in the State shall be determined using a 3-factor apportionment fraction:

8 1. the numerator of which is the sum of the property factor,
9 the payroll factor, and 4 times the sales factor; and

10 2. the denominator of which is 6;

11 (iii) for a taxable year beginning after December 31, 2019, but before
12 January 1, 2021, if the trade or business is a unitary business, the part of the corporation's
13 Maryland modified income derived from or reasonably attributable to trade or business
14 carried on in the State shall be determined using a 3-factor apportionment fraction:

15 1. the numerator of which is the sum of the property factor,
16 the payroll factor, and 5 times the sales factor; and

17 2. the denominator of which is 7;

18 (iv) for a taxable year beginning after December 31, 2020, but before
19 January 1, 2022, if the trade or business is a unitary business, the part of the corporation's
20 Maryland modified income derived from or reasonably attributable to trade or business
21 carried on in the State shall be determined using a 3-factor apportionment fraction:

22 1. the numerator of which is the sum of the property factor,
23 the payroll factor, and 6 times the sales factor; and

24 2. the denominator of which is 8; and

25 (v) for a taxable year beginning after December 31, 2021, if the trade
26 or business is a unitary business, the part of the corporation's Maryland modified income
27 derived from or reasonably attributable to trade or business carried on in the State shall
28 be determined using a single sales factor apportionment formula, by multiplying its
29 Maryland modified income by 100% of the sales factor.

30 (3) (i) Each year a worldwide headquartered company that filed a
31 federal corporate income tax return for the taxable year may elect to calculate its Maryland
32 modified income derived from or reasonably attributable to trade or business carried on in
33 the State using a 3-factor apportionment fraction:

34 1. the numerator of which is the sum of the property factor,

1 the payroll factor, and twice the sales factor; and

2 2. the denominator of which is 4.

3 (ii) To determine under subparagraph (i) of this paragraph the
4 Maryland modified income of a corporation or group of corporations that is a worldwide
5 headquartered company that filed a federal corporate income tax return for the taxable
6 year, gross income from intangible investments, including dividends, interest, royalties,
7 and capital gains from the sale of intangible property, shall be included in the calculation
8 of the numerator based on the average of the property and payroll factors.

9 (4) The property factor under paragraphs (2) and (3) of this subsection shall
10 include:

11 (i) rented and owned real property; and

12 (ii) tangible personal property located in the State and used in the
13 trade or business.

14 **(5) (I) FOR A TAXABLE YEAR BEGINNING AFTER DECEMBER 31,**
15 **2025, SALES OF TANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY SHALL BE INCLUDED IN THE**
16 **NUMERATOR OF THE SALES FACTOR UNDER PARAGRAPH (1), (2), OR (3) OF THIS**
17 **SUBSECTION IF:**

18 **1. THE PROPERTY IS DELIVERED OR SHIPPED TO A**
19 **PURCHASER WITHIN THE STATE, REGARDLESS OF THE FREE ON BOARD (F.O.B.)**
20 **POINT OR OTHER CONDITIONS OF THE SALE; OR**

21 **2. THE PROPERTY IS SHIPPED FROM AN OFFICE, A**
22 **STORE, A WAREHOUSE, A FACTORY, OR ANY OTHER PLACE OF STORAGE IN THE**
23 **STATE AND THE CORPORATION IS NOT TAXABLE IN THE STATE OF THE PURCHASER.**

24 **(II) FOR PURPOSES OF SUBPARAGRAPH (I) OF THIS**
25 **PARAGRAPH, A CORPORATION IS TAXABLE IN A STATE IF:**

26 **1. IN THAT STATE THE CORPORATION IS SUBJECT TO A**
27 **NET INCOME TAX, FRANCHISE TAX MEASURED BY NET INCOME, FRANCHISE TAX FOR**
28 **THE PRIVILEGE OF DOING BUSINESS, OR CORPORATE STOCK TAX; OR**

29 **2. THAT STATE HAS JURISDICTION TO SUBJECT THE**
30 **TAXPAYER TO A NET INCOME TAX, REGARDLESS OF WHETHER, IN FACT, THE STATE**
31 **IMPOSES A TAX.**

22 (a) In this section, "taxpayer" means:

23 (1) an individual filing an income tax return; or

24 (2) a married couple filing a joint income tax return.

25 (b) (1) A resident who is a taxpayer may claim a credit against the State
26 income tax for a taxable year in the amount determined under subsection (c) of this section
27 for earned income.

28 (2) A resident who is a taxpayer may claim a credit against the county
29 income tax for a taxable year in the amount determined under subsection (d) of this section
30 for earned income.

1 (c) (1) Except as provided in paragraphs (2) and (3) of this subsection and

2 **INCOME OR LOSS OF A TAXPAYER ENGAGED IN A UNITARY BUSINESS WITH A MEMBER**
3 **NOT INCLUDED IN THE COMBINED GROUP REPRESENTS AN AVOIDANCE OR EVASION**
4 **OF TAX, THE COMPTROLLER MAY, ON A CASE-BY-CASE BASIS, REQUIRE THAT ALL**
5 **OR PART OF THE INCOME AND ASSOCIATED APPORTIONMENT FACTORS OF THE**
6 **MEMBER BE INCLUDED IN THE TAXPAYER'S COMBINED RETURN.**

7 **(3) THE COMPTROLLER MAY REQUIRE:**

8 **(I) THE EXCLUSION OF ONE OR MORE FACTORS, THE**
9 **INCLUSION OF ONE OR MORE ADDITIONAL FACTORS, OR THE EMPLOYMENT OF ANY**
10 **OTHER METHOD THAT WILL FAIRLY REPRESENT THE TAXPAYER'S BUSINESS IN THE**
11 **STATE; OR**

12 **(II) THE EMPLOYMENT OF ANY OTHER METHOD TO EFFECTUATE**
13 **A PROPER REFLECTION OF THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF INCOME SUBJECT TO**
14 **APPORTIONMENT AND AN EQUITABLE ALLOCATION AND APPORTIONMENT OF THE**
15 **COMBINED GROUP'S OR ITS MEMBERS' INCOME.**

16 **(C) THE COMPTROLLER SHALL ADOPT REGULATIONS THAT ARE**
17 **NECESSARY AND APPROPRIATE TO CARRY OUT THIS SECTION.**

18 SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, for a taxable year beginning
19 after December 31, 2025, but before January 1, 2027, notwithstanding §§ 13-602 and
20 13-702 of the Tax – General Article, the Comptroller shall assess interest and penalties
21 under §§ 13-602 and 13-702 of the Tax – General Article if a corporation pays estimated
22 income tax for the taxable year in an amount less than 90% of the tax required to be shown
23 on the corporation's income tax return for the taxable year.

24 SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That Section 2 of this Act shall take
25 effect July 1, 2027, and shall be applicable to all taxable years beginning after December
26 31, 2026.

27 SECTION 6. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That Section 3 of this Act shall take
28 effect July 1, 2027, and shall be applicable to all taxable years beginning after December
29 31, 2027.

30 SECTION 7. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That, except as provided in
31 Sections 5 and 6 of this Act, this Act shall take effect July 1, 2024.
