- 18 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
- 19 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

- 2 (a) (1) In this section the following words have the meanings indicated.
- 3 (2) "Child care licensing region" means any one of 13 regions designated by 4 the Department to provide licensing and oversight for family child care programs.
- 5 (3) "Family child care" means the care given to a child under the age of 13 years or to a developmentally disabled person under the age of 21 years that is in place of parental care for less than 24 hours a day, in a residence other than the child's residence, 8 for which the family child care provider is paid.
- 9 (4) "Family child care provider" means an individual who cares for children 10 in a registered family child care home or a registered large family child care home.
- 11 (5) "Local [pilot] program" means a local jurisdiction or child care licensing 12 region that participates in the Program.
- 13 (6) "Program" means the Growing Family Child Care Opportunities [Pilot] 14 Program.
- 15 (7) "Start—up assistance" means the funding for starting a family child care 16 program including the cost of materials, curriculum, and renovations.
- 17 (b) (1) There is a Growing Family Child Care Opportunities [Pilot] Program 18 in the Department.
- 19 (2) The purpose of the Program is to provide grants to establish and 20 support local [pilot] programs in the State.
- 21 (3) The Department shall partner with the Maryland Child Care Resource 22 Network to administer the Program.
- 23 (c) (1) Except as provided in subsection (g) of this section, on or before 24 September 1, 2022, the Department shall award at least three grants, each of which does 25 not exceed \$150,000, in accordance with paragraph (2) of this subsection to establish and 26 support family child care providers in the State.
- 27 (2) (i) To be eligible for a grant under this section, a county governing 28 body or multiple county governing bodies shall sign a memorandum of understanding with 29 a child care resource center that serves the child care licensing region that contains one of 30 the counties.
- 31 (ii) The county or counties and the child care resource center jointly 32 shall apply for the grant and administer the local [pilot] program.

- 1 (d) Grant recipients shall: 2 (1) Use the grants to: 3 Establish and support a local [pilot] program; and (i) 4 (ii) Target the use of the grant to increase the supply and ensure the sustainability of family child care providers in areas with above average rates of poverty 5 6 and unemployment or areas with a lack of available child care providers; 7 Raise local matching funds, including in-kind matching resources at a (2) 8 1:1 match; 9 (3)Collaborate with existing family child care providers during the implementation of the Program; 10 11 Provide multilingual outreach to recruit individuals to become 12 registered family child care providers with the Department; 13 (5)Provide technical assistance, financial incentives, and start-up 14 assistance for recruited individuals as they navigate the Department's process to become a registered family child care provider; 15 16 Assist newly registered and established family child care providers 17 through technical assistance to achieve quality benchmarks, peer-to-peer mentoring, and 18 financial incentives; and 19 Establish partnerships with local chambers of commerce, or other local or state organizations for family child care providers that support small businesses and 20 women and minority-owned businesses to provide: 2122 Assistance to recruited individuals or registered family child care 23 providers in implementing best business practices; and 24(ii) Assistance in achieving financial sustainability. 25 (e) Subject to paragraph (2) of this subsection, for [each of] fiscal years 26 2023, [and] 2024, 2026, AND EACH FISCAL YEAR THEREAFTER, the Governor shall include in the annual budget bill an appropriation of \$450,000 to the Program. 27 28 (2)To the extent authorized under federal law, the Governor shall use 29 federal funds to satisfy the requirement of paragraph (1) of this subsection.
 - (g) (1) The Department may seek funding to start the Program.
