10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)						

The City of Hyattsville is one of 27 incorporated municipalities within Prince George's County, Maryland. It was established in 1886 and adopted its present Charter in 1983 and currently has a population of approximately 21,000 people. Located just minutes from Washington , D.C., 28 miles from downtown Baltimore and 24 miles west of Annapolis, the City is easily accessible by two metro rail stations within three commercial corridors. The executive offices of the City are located at the Municipal Building, 4310 Gallatin Street. City operations include the Police Department, Department of Public Works, Community Services and Community Development all of which provide services to its residents and ensures that the community is publicly safe and structurally sound.

## **11. Description and Purpose of Project** (Limit length to visible area)

The City of Hyattsville City Administration Building at 4310 Gallatin St was opened to the public in 1990. Is the 30+ years since a number of issues have arisen, the largest of which is the issue of ground water and storm water. Ground water is constantly rising to the surface in a number of natural springs in the area. Especially during heavy rain events the ground becomes over saturated and water not only comes through the asphalt in the parking lot but gets into the subterranean portions of the building. This water puts the elevator, electrical, and mechanical systems as risk in the building. It's not a matter of if, but when, the City will have a ground water related catastrophe.

The City has currently budgeted \$800,000 of ARPA funds for the renovation the the City Administration Building at 4310 Gallatin St. This is in addition to approximately \$500,000 in Capital Improvements made since the beginning of the Pandemic in March 2020, and \$280,000 in touchless public bathroom renovations that are currently ongoing. In FY25 the Hyattsville Police Department will be relocating to their new building at 3505 Hamilton St and their old space will be renovated to provide more space for the other City Departments to serve more of our residents.
