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## CHAPTER \_\_\_\_\_

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Election Law – Polling Place Procedures – Voting by Elderly Voters and Voters**  
3 **With Disabilities**  
4 **(Accessible and Expedited Voting Act of Maryland)**

5 FOR the purpose of requiring the State Board of Elections to establish guidelines for the  
6 local boards of election to implement a process to ~~accommodate and~~ expedite voting  
7 for elderly voters and voters with disabilities at each early voting center and polling  
8 place; requiring the local boards to implement the guidelines ~~and collect feedback on~~  
9 ~~the process from elderly voters and voters with disabilities and make immediate~~  
10 ~~adjustments to the process~~; requiring the training program for election judges to  
11 include instruction on ~~best practices for assisting~~ the guidelines for expediting voting  
12 for elderly voters and voters with disabilities; and generally relating to in-person  
13 voting by elderly voters and voters with disabilities.

SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,  
That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

**Article – Election Law**

1–101.

(a) In this article the following words have the meanings indicated unless a different meaning is clearly intended from the context.

(u) “Elderly” means 65 years of age or older.

10–206.

(e) The State Board shall provide election judges with uniform statewide training on the voting system, including:

(1) all features of the voting system that provide access to voters with disabilities; and

(2) the rights of voters with disabilities, including those rights guaranteed by State and federal law.

**(F) THE TRAINING PROGRAM SHALL INCLUDE INSTRUCTION ON ~~BEST PRACTICES FOR ASSISTING~~ THE GUIDELINES FOR EXPEDITING VOTING FOR ELDERLY VOTERS AND VOTERS WITH DISABILITIES, AS DEFINED IN THE FEDERAL AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT, AS ~~REQUIRED~~ ESTABLISHED UNDER § 10–310.1 OF THIS TITLE.**

**[(f)] (G)** Each local board shall conduct election judge training based on the program developed by the State Board.

**[(g)] (H)** (1) Except as provided in paragraph (2) of this subsection, each election judge shall participate in the training program provided for in subsection (a) of this section.

(2) An election judge who is appointed under emergency circumstances is not required to attend the course of instruction.

2 (A) THE STATE BOARD SHALL ESTABLISH GUIDELINES FOR THE LOCAL  
3 BOARDS TO IMPLEMENT A PROCESS TO ~~ACCOMMODATE AND~~ EXPEDITE VOTING FOR  
4 ELDERLY VOTERS AND VOTERS WITH DISABILITIES, AS DEFINED IN THE FEDERAL  
5 AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT, AT EACH EARLY VOTING CENTER AND  
6 POLLING PLACE IN THE STATE.

7 (B) THE GUIDELINES ESTABLISHED BY THE STATE BOARD UNDER  
8 SUBSECTION (A) OF THIS SECTION SHALL INCLUDE:

9 (1) DEDICATED EXPEDITED LINES FOR ELDERLY VOTERS AND  
10 VOTERS WITH DISABILITIES; AND

11 (2) CLEARLY MARKED SIGNAGE INDICATING THE AVAILABILITY OF  
12 EXPEDITED SERVICES;

13 ~~(3) PRIORITY SEATING FOR ELDERLY VOTERS AND VOTERS WITH~~  
14 ~~DISABILITIES IN WAITING AREAS; AND~~

15 ~~(4) SPECIFIC PROVISIONS FOR HIGH TRAFFIC EARLY VOTING~~  
16 ~~CENTERS AND POLLING PLACES.~~

17 (C) THE LOCAL BOARDS SHALL:

18 ~~(1) IMPLEMENT THE GUIDELINES ESTABLISHED BY THE STATE~~  
19 ~~BOARD UNDER SUBSECTION (A) OF THIS SECTION; AND~~

20 ~~(2) COLLECT FEEDBACK FROM ELDERLY VOTERS AND VOTERS WITH~~  
21 ~~DISABILITIES ON THE ACCOMMODATIONS AND EXPEDITED VOTING PROCESS WHILE~~  
22 ~~VOTING AT EARLY VOTING CENTERS AND POLLING PLACES IS IN PROGRESS AND~~  
23 ~~MAKE IMMEDIATE ADJUSTMENTS TO THE PROCESS AS NECESSARY.~~

24 (D) THE STATE BOARD SHALL MONITOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE  
25 GUIDELINES ESTABLISHED UNDER SUBSECTION (A) OF THIS SECTION BY THE LOCAL  
26 BOARDS AND SUBMIT A REPORT ON OR BEFORE JANUARY 15 EACH YEAR  
27 IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING A STATEWIDE ELECTION TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY IN  
28 ACCORDANCE WITH § 2-1257 OF THE STATE GOVERNMENT ARTICLE THAT  
29 INCLUDES:

30 (1) ANY CHALLENGES TO IMPLEMENTING THE GUIDELINES; AND

1                   ~~(2) AN ANALYSIS OF THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE ACCOMMODATIONS~~  
2 ~~AND EXPEDITED VOTING PROCESS;~~

3                   ~~(3) A SUMMARY OF FEEDBACK ON THE ACCOMMODATIONS AND~~  
4 ~~EXPEDITED VOTING PROCESS FROM ELDERLY VOTERS AND VOTERS WITH~~  
5 ~~DISABILITIES; AND~~

6                   ~~(4)~~ (2) ANY RECOMMENDATIONS TO IMPROVE THE GUIDELINES.

7                   SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the guidelines required under  
8 § 10–310.1 of the Election Law Article, as enacted by Section 1 of this Act:

9                   (1) shall be implemented beginning with the statewide primary election  
10 held in 2026; and

11                   (2) are not required to be implemented for any special elections that may  
12 occur before the statewide primary election held in 2026.

13                   SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July  
14 1, 2025.
