- 3 (F) (G) THE WORKGROUP SHALL MONITOR ISSUES AND MAKE 4 RECOMMENDATIONS RELATED TO ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE INCLUDING:
- 5 (1) THE REGULATION OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE USED IN 6 DECISIONS THAT SIGNIFICANTLY IMPACT THE LIVELIHOOD AND LIFE 7 OPPORTUNITIES OF INDIVIDUALS IN THE STATE;

- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July
  1, 2025. It shall remain effective for a period of 4 years and, at the end of June 30, 2029, this
  Act, with no further action required by the General Assembly, shall be abrogated and of no
  further force and effect.
